




Term 1 2023 has been a very exciting and extremely busy start to the new year. It was wonderful welcoming our students back to school this year, many expressing an appreciation to returning after their summer break.

As the Deputy Principal in charge of Year 9 and Year 12, I have been working closely with Mr Kisso and Ms Singh to program a number of initiatives that will assist all of our students in their educational journeys at Homebush Boys High School.

Open Night for Year 7 2024 parents and students has been scheduled for Thursday 2 March. The evening commences with the Principal's address in the hall at 5pm, followed by school tours of faculties and our learning environment. It poses to be a very exciting evening for all parties.





International Women's Day has been scheduled for Wednesday 8 March 2023. This year I will be attending Bankstown Girls High School's breakfast followed by guest speakers addressing various elements of International Women's Day. This year one of our Year 11 SRC students, James Knight, has been invited to be a guest speaker. The theme of James' speech is 'Cracking the Code – Innovation for a gender equal future'. Year 12

Years 8 & 11



Welcome parents and students to a new year at HBHS. The year has started off with a great deal of change in our school.

We have a brand new and reconfigured main entrance to the school and front office. But the biggest shock for the students has been the significant sections of the playground that are fenced off for one reason or another. The roof of the A Block was replaced and all the scaffolding has been removed by now. We should also see the completion of the basketball courts by the middle of March and the Futsal court on the Southern Grass is scheduled for completion a week or 2 later. As well, the work on the senior area should be completed by early March.

All these developments aim to make the school a better and more conducive setting for student interactions and learning. Mr Elgood needs to be recognised as the reason we are getting all these upgrades. It is his hard work and persistence over the past 3 years that have resulted in these and other upgrades around the school.

In the classrooms, we have a very settled Year 11 cohort. The photos that follow reflect the many outstanding achievements by Year 11 from late last year. In saying that, the vast majority of students in Year 11 will go on to successfully complete the requirements for the HSC and seek tertiary education opportunities. Whatever each student's goals are, I know that the next 18 months will be an enthralling journey for all participants.





Staff are currently issuing more BBBs (Bushy Boys Behaviour awards) than they have ever done before. This is a wonderful way to recognise student achievement and the upholding of the school's values of Safety, Learning and Respect. The BBBs are issued in the classroom as the first step to reward effort and application. The other end of the awards-spectrum at HBHS we find the Principal's Medal. At our presentation day in 2022, we were able to award a handful of Principal's Medals to students. These were the first medals awarded in several years. As a reminder, 30 BBBs equate to a Silver Award (as do 5 Bronze Awards), in turn 5 Silver Awards make a Gold Award and 2 Gold Awards result in a Principal's Medal. I remind students every week on assembly to accumulate awards and to see me when they have enough to receive the next award.





The year has started off well and I look forward to many, many more achievements by both staff and students in 2023.



HUMAN SOCIETY IN IT'S ENVIRONMENT

Term 1, 2023 the HSIE faculty has hit the ground running. I would like to welcome back the dedicated HSIE faculty who have been extremely busy preparing and programming for the new year. The faculty consists of Ms Lidia Budanovic, Ms Michelle Coutinho, Ms Phirum Duch, Mr Prakash Innasi, Mr Elie Kisso, Mr Pablo Morales and Ms Louise Symonds. I would also like to welcome two new staff members to our team this year Ms Melissa Gullifa and Mr Hamza Mahmood.

The year began with the HSIE faculty analysing the 2022 HSC results for our subjects: Ancient History, Business Studies, Economics, Extension History, Geography, Legal Studies, Modern History and Studies of Religion. The HSC results were outstanding for all our subjects and revealed strong value adding to the education of our students. Analysis of the results gives teachers the opportunity to evaluate current practices and discuss the implications for future practices.

Our subjects saw the highest growth in the top 3 bands 4-6 and a reduction in the lowest three bands 1-3. In Ancient History, the school achieved their highest results compared to the last three years, with three students receiving a Band 6 and 66% of the students achieving a band 4 or higher. Business Studies also achieve amazing results with 73% of the students receive a band 4 or higher. Economics results showed that over 76% of the students received a band 4 or higher. Geography has proven once again that dedication and a good work ethic can lead to enormous value adding with 100% of the students receiving a band 3 or higher. In Legal Studies, nine of the thirteen students achieved a personal best score, with 77% of students achieving a band 5 or higher. Modern History received two band 6's with 69% of the students achieving a band 4 or higher. Studies of Religion saw great growth in student learning with 100% of the students receiving a band 3 or higher.

On top of the Christmas Hampers, our Prefect body also held its first fundraiser, Donut Day. Pre-orders began well before the main event and we managed to sell over 40 boxes in pre-sales. 

Year 7 Students



While still in primary school (in Year 6), most new Year 7 students were involved in the Best Start reading and numeracy on-line assessment. These results are now available to this school, and allow us to diagnose students' areas of strength and weakness.

These assessments do not generate reports to parents. However, any parents who would like to find out their son's results are invited to contact me, at the school (Tuesdays and Thursdays).

Year 7 & 9 Students

Year 7 & 9 students are preparing for the upcoming NAPLAN tests, which are earlier this year ($15^{th} - 27^{th}$ March). This year, again, <u>all NAPLAN tests will be on-line</u>, so it is important that students be prepared for this. Information letters are being sent, to affected parents.

All Year 9 students are reminded to revise all literacy/numeracy homework quizzes which were completed in Semester 2 last year, and which are still available on the same Google Classroom platform. They are excellent preparation for the NAPLAN tests.

Year 10 Students

The NSW Educational Standards Authority (NESA) has stated that students need to <u>achieve minimum literacy &</u> <u>numeracy standards</u> in order to gain an HSC. This Term, in Week 7, **all Year 10 students will all need to sit for on-line tests (in reading, writing and numeracy), in order to demonstrate these standards.**

A letter has been sent, to provide more details to Year 10 parents.



MATHEMATICS

Their work books should also be kept in a neat and tidy condition with legible writing and clear diagrams, so they are able to refer back to it in the future.

Mathematics Results

Mathematics students performed admirably in the 2022 Higher School Certificate. The breakdown was as follows:

- Band 6's
 - \rightarrow 1 in Mathematics Standard 2
 - \rightarrow 5 in Mathematics Advanced
- Band E4's
 - \rightarrow 6 in Mathematics Extension 1
 - \rightarrow 4 in Mathematics Extension 2

Moreover, each of the 14 students in Extension 2 Mathematics received a Notional Band 6. Congratulations to these boys on their excellent results!

Mathematics Puzzle

Mathematics is important because it strengthens our ability to think rationally. Numeracy equips us with the senses of quantity, calculation, estimation, space, statistics, and probability. We all use these senses every day to interact with the world around us.


One way to build numeracy is to attempt difficult problems. Allowing time to think deeply about a solution develops our numerical senses. Deep thought creates and strengthens connections within the brain, which improves cognitive function and mental health—so maths is good for you!

Try to strengthen your brain by attempting the following question! (The solution will be in the next edition of the Bush Bulletin.)

You are required to colour-in each shape below using red, yellow or blue, following the listed rules.

- 1. No triangles are red.
- 2. One of the squares is blue.
- 3. Each pair of similar shapes must be shaded different colours, so there cannot be 2 yellow triangles, or 2 blue squares.
- 4. There is one red shape in the middle column, and no red shapes in the left column.
- 5. There are no blue shapes next to each other.






(The answer to the question in the last Bush Bulletin is below.)

The surface area that can be seen by looking up from below the pyramid is that of $4 \times 4 = 16$ squares each measuring $1 \text{ m} \times 1 \text{ m}$. So the surface area of the base is 16 m^2 ,

The view looking down from above the pyramid is shown in the diagram. The surface area that can be seen is made up of a complete $1 \text{ m} \times 1 \text{ m}$ square, some three-quarter squares and some half squares. Without adding these up, we can see that the surface area is also 16 m^2 .

The view from each of the four sides is made up of a pyramid of 10 squares whose surface area is 10 m^2 .

Therefore, the total surface area is $2 \times 16 \text{ m}^2 + 4 \times 10 \text{ m}^2 = 72 \text{ m}^2$.





TEACHING & LEARNING

This term, our Years 7, 8 and 9 Literacy classes have been busily working on sentence structure, grammar, morphology and writing. Our Literacy teachers are Miss Jang, Miss Gullifa, Ms Abraham and Mrs Achmad.

Time spent reading each day is important for your son's reading growth. Regular exposure to reading improves academic background knowledge, vocabulary and spelling.

In Literacy periods once a fortnight, we are implementing a wide reading program called *Scholastic Literacy Pro* to motivate students to read regularly and support students to find the right book for their areas of interest. Students have been completing a reading level assessment to determine their Lexile reading level to allow their teachers to create personalised goals for their reading and comprehension. Our goal for each student is that for one



year of learning and application, there will be one year's growth in reading. Teachers and students will be able to track their progress throughout the year. It is very important that students read for at least 20 minutes each day. Research also shows there are academic and emotional benefits to reading aloud to your child and asking questions to gauge their understanding.

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NAPLAN 2023

Dear Parents and Carers,

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a point in time assessment of literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life. Each year students in Years 7 and 9 participate in tests for writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

From 2023, NAPLAN is moving to Term 1 and will take place from **Wednesday 15 March** to **Monday 27 March 2023**. The reason for this change is so that results can be returned to schools earlier in the year which will support teachers to understand the learning needs of their students and plan accordingly.

NAPLAN tests are just one part of our school learning assessment program and questions are primarily based on knowledge, understanding and skills gained from the prior year of schooling.

In preparation for NAPLAN 2023, our school will undertake activities to help students to become familiar with the format and functionality of the online tests. These activities are not an assessment of student ability and will not be marked.

Students and parents can access the <u>public demonstration site</u> to familiarise themselves with NAPLAN and the types of questions and tools available.

Information for parents and carers NAPLAN 2023



What is NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses the literacy and numeracy skills of students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9.

Students participate in NAPLAN tests in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

NAPLAN provides an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. The tests are just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process – it does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance.

NAPLAN also provides schools and education authorities with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

The benefits of NAPLAN tests online

More precise results with an adaptive design: Tailored tests adapt to a student's performance and ask questions that match the student's achievement levels.

Better engagement: Research into online assessment indicates that students engage well with online tests as the questions are tailored to their achievement levels.

Tailored testing

Tailored testing provides a more precise assessment of a student's performance. Students at each year level start the tests with a similar set of questions. Depending on the number of questions they answer correctly, the next set of questions may be more, or less, difficult. A student's NAPLAN result is based on both the amount and difficulty of questions the student answers correctly. A student who completes a more difficult set of questions is more likely to achieve a higher score.

Supporting your child

The best approach for preparing your child for NAPLAN is to encourage your child to do the best they can on the day.

Excessive preparation or the use of coaching providers is not recommended.

NAPLAN 2023 test window

From 2023, NAPLAN will be held in March. This change has been made so results can be returned to schools earlier in the year. This will support teachers to understand the learning needs of their students and allow them to plan accordingly.

NAPLAN test window: 15 - 27 March 2023.

The 9-day test window accommodates schools with fewer devices that require flexibility in scheduling.



What if my child was absent on the day of a scheduled NAPLAN test?

Where possible, schools may arrange catch-up tests for individual students who were absent on the day of a scheduled NAPLAN test.

All Year 3 writing catch-up tests must be completed by Friday 20 March 2023.

All other catch-up tests must be completed by Monday 27 March 2023.

COVID-19 advice

Parents should keep students at home if they are experiencing COVID-19 symptoms.

Your child's school will be required to conduct NAPLAN testing in accordance with the latest NSW Government COVID-19 advice.

Year 3 writing test

The Year 3 writing test is conducted on paper. All other Year 3 NAPLAN tests will be online.

Students' digital skills

The digital skills required to complete NAPLAN are skills that students use in everyday classroom activities.

Students do not need to be able to touch type to complete the test. The online test is not about keyboard skills (just as the paper test was not about handwriting skills).

Withdrawals and exemptions

You can withdraw your child from NAPLAN tests.

A student may be granted a formal exemption if they have:

- significant intellectual disability and/or students with significant comorbidity that severely limit their capacity to participate in the tests, or
- a language background other than English, arrived from overseas and have been attending school in Australia for less than a year before the test.

Contact your child's school for further information and to complete the parent/carer consent form.

Privacy

NESA is responsible for the collection of personal information from NSW schools to be used during NAPLAN testing and reporting.

All data collected for NAPLAN is managed in accordance with NSW and Federal privacy legislation described in NESA's privacy management plan, which can be found on the NESA website:

Results

Parents/carers receive two reports showing their child's achievements in NAPLAN: the individual student report (ISR) and additional student report (ASR). The ISR and ASR should always be interpreted with care. Teachers will have the best insight into a child's educational progress.

Reports are dispatched to schools who then distribute the reports to parents/carers.

My Experience with Electronics

In electronics this year, our teacher, Mr Madakasira introduced us to parallel and series circuits.

After explaining the difference between the circuits, he guided us on what we were building for this term and how to make it. But before we entered the workshop, we had to complete a booklet guiding us on operating the machines and being safe around them. The book explained the band saw and disk sander, just to name a few. To build the circuit, we had to use the saw to cut our boards in half, use the disk sander, hammer in nails, and of course, use the soldering iron.

To build the series and parallel circuit which was needed for the task we had to:

Using a scroll saw to cut the wood in half

Using a sander to sand the sides of the timber to keep it flat

Hammering nails into the timber (6 nails into the series circuit and 8 nails for the parallel circuit)

Installing the resistor, capacitor, dial, and lights into our two circuits

Using the soldering iron to melt the wires onto the nail to support the LEDS and ETWs.



Adding Electrical Transportation Wires (ETW) through the nails

Once we finished soldering and hammering, the last step was to test the finished products. If completed correctly, the lights on the circuit will light up with a bright light. Indicating the power is flowing through properly with the capacity of a 9 Volt battery. And the circuit worked just as how Mr Madakasira told us.

All in all, it was really fun and exciting, learning new skills and having fun in the workshop!

Aarush Chauhan Year 9



Dear Parents & Caregivers

If your child is in **Year 7** or **Year 10** this year, you can now provide online consent for their routine school vaccinations. In Year 7, students are offered free vaccines for diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (dTpa) and human papillomavirus (HPV). In Year 10, students are offered the meningococcal ACWY vaccine.

Vaccination will only be provided at school if consent has been received.

How to provide consent:

- To complete online consent for your child's school vaccinations, visit: <u>https://nswhealth.service-now.com/school</u>
- Follow the steps to log in to your existing ServiceNSW account. This is the same account you may
 already use to renew your driver's licence. If you don't have a <u>ServiceNSW</u> account, refer to
 ServiceNSW to create one.
- 3. Update or confirm your personal details in ServiceNSW as required.
- 4. Complete the School Vaccination Consent Form for your child/ren. You will need to:
 - a) Enter your child's personal details
 - b) Provide the Medicare card details for you and your child
 - c) Read the linked Parent Information Sheet and privacy statement
 - d) Provide consent

If you or your child do not have a Medicare card, consent can still be provided by requesting a paperbased consent form directly from your child's school.

The benefits of providing consent online:

- easily update your child's details
- receive SMS and/or email notifications when vaccinations are given
- faster upload of vaccination records to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR).







Final changes have been made this past week so all boys have settled and are enjoying their new electives.

Our first year assembly is on Thursday 23rd of February, where we will hear from the new school counsellor, Jessica De Bono-McClure and Student Support Officer, Lauren DiBiasi. They will both talk to the boys about transitioning into Year 11 and managing study as well as their mental health. At the assembly, we will also be handing out all Blue and Maroon Awards from 2022. This cohort has always held the record for the most Blue and Maroon awards in any year group and I can confidently say they didn't disappoint again this time around! I feel so proud to see so many boys putting in effort and just trying their best across all subjects.

BLACKDOG INSTITUTE

Future Proofing Study Results





As I have written about over the past few years, a group of boys in Year 11 have been participating in the Future Proofing Study by the Blackdog Institute. They have recently released some data on some of the findings which I thought I would share.

A little bit about the study - In 2019, the Black Dog Institute launched the Future Proofing Study, now one of Australia's largest and most comprehensive cohort studies of adolescent mental health. The Future Proofing Study advances knowledge about the risk and protective factors associated with the onset and development of adolescent depression, anxiety, and other mental health conditions.

The findings are shared widely to inform healthcare and education policies and shape how mental health programs are designed and delivered for young Australians. A total of 6,388 high school students from 134 Australian schools are participating, with cohort demographics representative of the Australian adolescent population. Participating students complete annual questionnaires covering various topics, including mental health, wellbeing, quality of life, resilience, sleep, schooling, peer relationships, bullying, technology use, early life experiences, and puberty. They commence the study in Year 8 (mean age 13.9 years) and continue to be followed up annually at school for 5 years.

Sleep and Mental Health

We know that quality sleep is crucial for optimal physical and mental functioning. Research suggests that teenagers should aim for 8-10 hours of sleep each night. In Year 8, our students fell short of this, sleeping on average 7 hours and 45 minutes each night, with 17% of students reporting less than 6 hours of sleep each night. The data also found




a clear link between sleep problems and mental health. Compared to students without sleep problems, students with insomnia were:

- 6 times more likely to have high depression symptoms
- 4 times more likely to have high anxiety symptoms

Screen Time and Depression

Screen time and symptoms of depression were closely linked, with more screen time being associated with higher rates of depression in adolescents. They tested a range of hypotheses to try and understand what explains the stronger link between screen time and depression in females, including:


- Increased cyberbullying
- Detrimental impacts on sleep
- Negative self-evaluation from using social media
- Displacement of in-person social support networks

We have over thirty Year 11 members in the club and we would love for some more junior students to get on board also. All students are welcome to come along and get involved in some great initiatives. 
