Firstly, we are resuming our normal Presentation Day ceremony. Whilst we had modified presentations in the previous 2 years, largely due to the COVID restrictions, this year we are back to holding the ceremony in the Marie Bashir Primary School Hall. 
Visual Arts stage 4

Year 7 Lino Prints

Students in our Stage 4 Visual Arts classes experiment with and learn about a variety of mediums and materials throughout the year as they develop confidence and technical skills in artmaking. This term Year 7 has been investigating lino printing.

Lino Printing is the process of carving a piece of lino for printing into a series called an **edition**. In Year 7 we are learning to draw a still-life and develop them into a design that is suitable for carving. We have seen our original ideas evolve into interesting and colourful prints. A still-life is an arrangement of objects, we used sunflowers because we looked at the artist Vincent Van Gogh who painted many vases of sunflowers in the 19th century.



Ancient and Modern History



Looking forward to the National Science Week in 2023.


One of the contestants sends his paper plane on to a flight.

My Experience with Woodwork

Woodwork has been very fun with all the classes we have had so far. We have done a variety of activities from, Onguard Training, worksheets, to even most of us finishing our pencil case and portfolio.

The Steps we have done so far:

In our first few classes we were given time to finish our Onguard Training and the Safety Poster, as if we did not finish the Onguard training we would not be allowed in the workshop to begin the process of building the pencil case.

Secondly, we were given our piece of wood with a runway already in it. We had to mark out our lines on the wood to see where we have to cut. So firstly, we need to use a tri-square and mark off the side, so it is square. Then we need to measure 250 millimetres and mark it off. Then leave a centimetre gap and repeat this exact step. Next measure 90 millimetres and leave a centimetre gap like before and repeat this step as well.

Next, you will need to cut your wood with a coping saw through the centimetre gap. After you are all done with this step, then you will need to sand off the excess area.

Next you will need to glue all your pieces together, with all the runways aligned and nailed in with the nails being punched.

After this, you will then have to complete sanding your project so it is all smooth. A tip is that there is never enough sanding and always use the time that you're given to sand your project.

Next, we had to do research on what drawing we had to put on the pencil case so it was all decorated nicely. Then we had to draw all over pictures.

After this, we had to get perspex and measure it to fit through the runways that we had. We then had to sand the end of one side to get a circular formation.

The final step of them all was to add danish oil over the whole project to give it a clean look.

After we made all the joints, we had to put the Storage box together, We connected the joints and got a piece of plywood so that it could be the base of this project, We then glued it together, clamped it up and put it aside so that it could dry. The next day I was on my last step and that was to add a timber finish to the storage box so that It will look nice and completed, Mr Luciani then poured the oil into a cup for us to lay out the finish to our desire after doing so we let it dry; these are the finishing results.

I used modelling and animating software called Blender to create a short animation. This was in fact an assignment where I got to build up an animation from the ground up. Currently, I am working with another student to make our own animated short story using the same software. In the end, Graphics Technology is a great subject to pick and I highly recommend it to any Year 8 students that are interested in designing and creating animations.

Timber Project

For the first semester of timber, our class came to a mutual agreement of making an occasional table. We decided to cut a 520mm individual piece of radiata pine timber into three equal separate pieces, after that we cut out biscuit slots with the biscuit cutter. We then use biscuits and glue to fill these slots up and then used sash clamps to hold them down for a day. We made the legs by cutting a 1200mm piece of pine into two 600mm pieces. We then created a slot by measuring out 70mm from both edges and 9.5mm out from the line to create a pocket where the timber could slide in. Our final piece of pine we used was to create a base; throughout the project our table will have rounded edges to create a smoother look. Overall the table proved to be effective and worked perfectly.




The Experience in Graphics Class



Focus on Sleeping Habits

Amount of Sleep Required

Approximately 70% of teenagers are sleep deprived

Dr Chris Seton from the Sleepshack says the best way to judge how much sleep a child needs is to assess whether it's "enough for them to wake spontaneously - meaning without an alarm clock – on most mornings and avoid tiredness during the day at least until the last hour before bedtime".

A guide to hours of sleep/ night:

- Preschoolers (3-5 years old): 10-13hrs
- School Aged Children (6-13years old): 9-11 hrs
- Teens (14-17 years old): 8-10 hrs



Signs that Children are Tired

Signs that children are tired are often overlooked or misinterpreted. The signs and the subsequent effects, fall under four areas: cognitive, physiological, psychological, psychosocial.

Cognitive

Physiological

Psychological

Psychosocia

Learning & Memory, Attention, Problem Solving

Good sleep helps concentration and motivation along with consolidation and strengthening of new information and memories. When your child is tired they have difficulty focusing on activities and processing new information. Without a good night's sleep, the brain struggles to consolidate each day's learning and retain memory. Teachers report poor short-term memory in tired children, that is, teachings go "in one ear and out the other".

Sleep Thieves: Why Are Children & Teenagers Tired?

Causes for insufficient hours of quality sleep in children and teenagers fall under 3 areas: habits, physical/biological causes and psychological causes.

Habits

Physical / Biological

Psychological

Extra Common Sleep Problems

Many of these habits are influenced by a lack of understanding of the importance of sleep. This combined with a busy lifestyles and the drive to be socially connected means sleep becomes undervalued and a low priority.

- Irregular weekly bedtimes and weekend sleep ins: This confuses the body clock. Sleeping in particularly on Sunday starts the school week off on a bad note.
- Sensory overload/multitasking: Flicking between homework, technology etc creates a wired inefficient brain that finds it hard to wind down and go to sleep
- Electronic Devices too close to bedtime and/or wake you over night: The blue light emitted from the devices inhibits the hormone melatonin that helps us sleep. Adding to this the device content excites the brain making it hard to go to sleep.

 Being woken messes with the natural sleep cycles.
- Studying too late: Tired brains are slow and inefficient. This creates the cycle of taking longer to do homework, which delays bedtime further
- Exercise too close to bedtime: raises body temperature and cortisol levels making it harder for some people to fall asleep soon afterwards
- · Poor bed association: Using technology and doing other activities in/on bed leads to mixed messages to the brain that bed is for restful sleep
- Stimulant use: caffeine, energy drinks, alcohol, drugs all impact on sleep quality

Helping teenagers get the sleep they need

Good daytime habits can help teenagers get the sleep they need, especially as they get towards the later teenage years. These habits can also help children avoid or sort out any sleep problems that come up.

Here are some habits you could encourage your child to try. Your child might need to try several things to work out what helps them the most.

Waking, sleeping and napping routines

- Keep wake-up times on school days and weekends to within 2 hours of each other. This helps to keep the body clock regular.
- · Get out of bed when they wake up in the morning, rather than staying in bed.
- Spend the hour before lights out avoiding screens and doing relaxing activities like reading, listening to music or having a warm shower.
- Keep daytime naps to no more 20 minutes, and make sure the nap is in the early afternoon.

Transport is better for us to get to places, because it is better, faster and easier.


My first point is that you get faster access, and it is better for people who don't have cars, and for school students, when they are going to school, or going back home.



I would also like to mention a special thank you to a group of Year 10 Peer Support leaders who attended the recent Year 7 camp as mentors. Australia has a strong and resilient democracy. Discuss.





We have had and continue to have among the oldest, most enduring and unbroken democracies in the world, with merely a single exception. Malcolm Fraser's conspiracy to dismiss the Whitlam government was characterised as a coup, but even then a show of resilience in the peaceful transfer of power from Labor to Liberal was displayed. Our democracy has survived two world wars, a conscription crisis and a paradoxical attempt to ban the Australian Communist party under the government of Sir Robert Menzies. Indeed it was Australia's robust democracy that ensured the proposals' defeat in both the High Court and by the hands of Australians themselves at the ballot box; despite the fact that Australians never voted in great numbers for the Communist party.

However, this is not to say that our democracy does not face challenges now and into the future.

One of these challenges, and the focus of this application, is Australia's political media and its implications on our democracy. In my opinion, Australia's political media is not satisfactory. The rise of political narratives in media - in

which a pre-emptive stance on a given topic or issue is determined before real investigation and research, media bias, and the lack of adequate representation on Indigenous affairs all pose great threats to our democracy.

The majority of Australia's media organisations with the exceptions of the ABC and SBS are privately run companies with a profitable business in mind. This allows powerful news organisations to push political bias and narrative as the proprietors in a said company control what the organisation puts out to the public. Not only does this satisfy wealthy media giants as it propels their specific political views, but narrative journalism and media are more appealing to the general public as they perform similar to entertainment rather than traditional news, intended to inform. Specifically, the Murdoch monopoly has a stranglehold on Australian media owning such a large quantity. Many Australians

consciously or unconsciously are influenced by his output. And although I disagree with Murdoch on his political views, the absence of diversity in ownership and political views in media would be the same issue if it were dominated by the left. For democracy to be given a fair go a diverse spread of political views in media must be available without a few that trump over the rest.

Regarding the inadequate media representation on Indigenous Australian affairs, a history of oppression is to blame, along with a largely monocultural media industry that lacks proper representation and employment of indigenous people. An underrepresentation and often negative portrayal of Indigenous Australians is of great danger in our democracy as the mark of a healthy democracy is one that protects its minorities in spite of the absence of their electoral strength.

I believe our democracy has and will continue to endure the challengers of the past and present day. Our last election saw a record number of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander representatives elected to parliament, a Labor Government has been placed into power in spite of Murdoch media backing Scott Morrison, and a new wave of politics is among us all under the robust and resilient systems of Australian democracy.


