


employers, government and other social and antisocial institutions all have different messages.

# Deputy Principal's Report



The signs and symbols we observe around schools are often very good indicators of the quality of the programs, policies and personnel. Many people and groups from outside the school regularly use our premises after school hours. Their comments on what they see left behind provide a good insight into the practices undertaken by the students and staff during the day.

The attractive state of the buildings and grounds, and in particular the examples of student work on display, are always a subject for comment. School resources are used to create an environment which is attractive for students and teachers, but it is the respect shown by students which assists in maintaining these standards. The lack of neglect reflects the care taken by students and the sense of responsibility they have towards property which is not their own.

The vast quantity and quality of student work on display reflects the rigour evident in the classroom where art work is created, literature is written or mathematics calculated. The trophies, memorabilia

and honour boards are evidence of years of endeavour which our school community acknowledges and sets as standards for future generations of students.

There is a belief among the boys and staff that success is achievable for all. I was impressed by *Tommy Chan*'s enormous achievement in winning a prize in the Maths competition but it was equally as satisfying knowing that six hundred and ninety eight boys have confidence enough to enter the competition. Many schools enter only their elite candidates, yet seven out of every ten Homebush boys were prepared to challenge themselves and gain the benefits of formal examination practice. Some of these boys have only average Mathematics ability but unlimited confidence and a "have a go" attitude.

Whether acknowledging the successes of *Gareth Williams*, (The Inner West Youth Ambassador) The Open Table Tennis Team (Australian Champions) The Open Water Polo Team (NSW CHS Champions for the fifth successive year), *Shane Lodge* (NSW Boxing Champion), *Hong Nguyen* (Science Awards), *Rahulan Jegatheeswaran* (First in Year 12) or the 256 students who received Silver Awards throughout the year, the range and opportunities for participation and the achievement of excellence is unlimited.

As parents you can be confident the best interests of your son are at the centre of all activities within the school. As students you can have confidence in the quality of instruction and example you will receive. As teachers we ask only that you do your best.

Schools should be a safe and happy, place where students can develop their academic, social and sporting potential. Homebush Boys' is such a place.

# David Nim

1981-1997

David Nim, of Year Eleven, died in hospital on 6th December. David was diagnosed with Acute Lymphoblastic Leukaemia in Year 9 and fought its effects for two years.

David's death came as a great shock to his Year 11 peers who were numbed and emotional when told. But their love and respect for David and their admiration for the manner in which he coped with his illness has been evident in their actions since hearing of his death.

On the 11th of December thirty students joined David's family in a service for David at the funeral parlour in Fairfield. The next day fifty Year 11 students, accompanied by their Year Adviser and the School Counsellor, travelled to Leppington to form a guard of honour for David at his burial. The simple Buddhist ceremony was enhanced by the presence of the boys who stood with quiet, loving respect honouring David and his family.

The words of the students in the memorial assembly held at the school on the following Tuesday conveyed their feelings as eloquently as their actions of the previous week.

His friend Peter Lu likened David to the universe: "The universe started with a big bang according to scientists. That is how David started his day: with a big bang. So energetic so full of life. I will really miss his smile. After staying in hospital for a long period of time he would come back to school with a smile, as though nothing had happened, as if it was just another school day. I admired him for that. We all take life for granted. The death of a friend, a close friend for me, changes the way we look at life. Cherish the memory of his smile. It will warm you, it will make you safe. The universe is ever expanding, according to scientists. So will our memories of David."

Tim Tsang remembered David's generosity. "In Year 8, I got to know David's characteristics. He was a very kind person. Since he was so kind I knew who to look for when I needed money for my lunch. When we were in the same PE class we used to fake the 1.6km run. He used to come in last, about three minutes behind the one in front: me. But what I saw in David was his enthusiasm for life and his endurance. These impressed me deeply. David's life was short but nothing can erase him from our memory."

George So's memory of David stretched back to Kindergarten and to the two little boys who helped their teacher. "I knew David as Soi-Senh in Kindergarten and Year 1 at Ashfield Primary School. He used to get a lot of prizes for his little deeds around the classroom and I would end up second after him in receiving prizes for my deeds. David was a cheerful person who had no problems with other students. I still have a photograph of him with two other students and myself playing with our racing cars."

Wilson Ly reiterated what the other boys said and told of his friendship and love for David.

George Deftereos described the aura that surrounded David. He was deeply moved by David's death and joined with the other boys in saying how much he would miss him.

Gareth Williams, the School Captain, did not know David well but gave support to students in shock, attended both the service at Fairfield and the Burial ceremony and led the memorial assembly.

David's life will be remembered always by his friends. His death will also be remembered for its unifying effect on Year 11.

# School Captain's Farewell Speech

Teachers, students, parents, Year 12, friends: When I first came to this school all it ever really meant to me were some bricks and mortar. I just came to school to read a few books, listen to a few lessons and then was happy to go back home. But it is only now, and ironically only at the end of Year 12, that I have come to realise what Homebush Boys High School really means to me.

While I have been at this school, I have learnt many things, good and bad, which have made me a better human being. I enrolled in Mr Balan's Chemistry class with the hope that I would become a better chemistry student. However I did not count on becoming an expert on food technology as well. Mr.Balan's afternoon chats on what he and his family had for dinner the night before sent all our senses reeling. And of course, how could we forget Ms.Degney's history class? Whether the lesson be about WWI, WWII, the Great Depression or the Gulf Crisis, it hinged upon the all important debate, *The importance of women in the 1990's*. I'm sure her efforts to convert us all into avid feminists have not been in vain.

So as we leave the hallowed corridors of Homebush Boys High School, I now realise that the school is not merely bricks and mortar, it is not just facts and figures and it is not just books and lessons. There is so much more to this school: something that I was never able to touch, or feel, or even knew existed until it was taken away from me.

At the end of this year, we the graduating class of 1997, will leave school, with a certificate in one hand and a number in the other- a number which is supposed to tell us how good a student we were. But ladies and gentlemen, is that all Homebush Boys is all about: a number and a piece of paper? I think not. To me what Homebush Boys really means, is the friends which I have made. For you see, the friends that I have made, the people I have known and the faces which have grown so very familiar is the

very essence of Homebush Boys High School. To me a friend is someone who will catch me when I fall, someone who will comfort me in my sadness, someone who will enjoy my success and bear my failures and that is exactly what I've found in Homebush Boys High School.

We have all achieved a lot of things over the past twelve months. Our water polo team has won yet another state championship, our cricket team have come even closer to winning the coveted Davidson Shield and our debating team has had a prolific year. But to what avail are all of these achievements? Aren't they just another fact to throw into the archive?

The very beauty in these things is that we can share them, and it is the sharing of these achievements that make them truly great. It is this very brotherhood, this very coming together of students and teachers alike to share all of our successes and failures that makes Homebush Boys High School so very dear to me. It is this camaraderie which I have grown fond of and which I shall miss and it is for this reason that I am proud to say that I finished my Year I2 at Homebush Boys High School.

Over the past year, we've all ebbed closer to the ideal of finishing Year 12. We've all had goals. Some of us simply wanted to finish Year 12, others wanted to attend university and of course Rahulan and Johan wanted to get a perfect TER of 100. However, the fact that we've all come closer to achieving our goals shows us that we've matured into young adults. Our persistence, determination and sacrifice to achieve these goals shows we have grown into greater individuals.

So ladies and gentlemen, in years to come I will forget Mr. Balan's Chemistry class (I'm sorry, Sir), and the memories of Ms. Degney's class may even fade, but there is one solitary thing which I shall never forget. One thing shall remain locked in my heart for all time, and this is the memory of you, my friends. Your faces shall never fade, and your memory will never disappear, because that is the greatest gift this school has ever given me, and it is the greatest gift I could have possibly dreamed of receiving.

In 1997 you, the Year 12 class, gave me the role of Captain. It is a role which I have felt both privileged and proud to have had: not because of the title or the shiny badge, but because it was given to me by my friends. My election as captain

indicated to me that my friends believed in me. So for making me captain I sincerely thank you. But for making me your friend, I have grown to love you (In a manly kind of way).

Old men forget, yet all shall be forgot but he will remember with advantages what facets he did that day.



For he, shall surely be my brother. Forever and ever."



# **ADMINISTRATION**

### **CAREERS**

Another successful year for our students with regards to the 1996 HSC. Information provided by The Sydney Morning Herald suggested that the school's results place Homebush as the top Comprehensive Boys' High School in the Metropolitan East area and seventh overall of all comprehensive schools in New South Wales. However, as stated in the Bush Bulletin early in the year this school believes that it is misleading and wrong to highlight just the top students. We are proud of all our students and the effort they have put into their studies.

Each year the Career Adviser undertakes a telephone survey of our Year 12 students of the previous year and over the years the results have remained fairly constant. For our students last year, figures show that out of the 149 students there were:-

69 students undertaking university study,

25 full time TAFE courses,

7 apprenticeships,

10 in full time employment,

4 in private colleges,

3 students undertaking University preparation courses,

2 part-time work,

2 undertaking "Pathways", 11 repeating their HSC,

2 unemployed,

3 students studying or travelling overseas and

14 students could not be contacted.

For students to be successful in their endeavours towards careers, students need to ensure they are active in their research into the different options available to them. This entails them looking at Career orientated literature, attending Open days at all institutions of Higher Education (Universities, TAFEs and Private Providers), and talking to employees, employee organisations and business organisations. This will allow the student to make informed decisions about career moves.

# **ENGLISH**

While English is certainly about spelling, vocabulary and the rules of grammar, it is most importantly about communication, about understanding what others write and say, and about being able to express thoughtful, considered responses to what we see, hear and read.

If a student has these skills he will never be conned by bureaucratic rhetoric, slick advertising or false arguments. He will be able to comprehend the world in which he lives, and be able to stand up for himself while making important decisions and contributions in those areas of life which are important to him.

Often when we as teachers look at our students, their shirt tails hanging out of their trousers at the end of the day as they hurry away from school - it is difficult to remember that each one of them is an important and unique individual, with specific interests and hidden personal talents. (Certainly, many of them fail to realise that their teachers are not just automatons, that they are human too!) Students come to school, preoccupied with family problems, trying to cope with adolescence and concerned with finding their place in our ever more competitive and impersonal world.

English teachers often see more than one hundred students in the course of a day. If we divide our lesson time each day by the number of students in each class; in an eighty minute lesson each student has roughly two minutes and forty seconds to personally interact with his teacher. (That is assuming each student gets an equal share of the teacher's time!) This is not an ideal model for teaching, by any means. That is why the contribution of parents and guardians is so important.

As we hurtle towards the twenty first century it is becoming more and more challenging to encourage young men to value the pleasures of reading, the skills of effective writing and the importance of being able to articulate thoughts and feeling through speech. A teacher can never have the same influence over your sons as your do!

If you help your son plan his homework using his "Study Planner" - you will help him learn life long organisational skills. If you show him that you value all types of reading, he will too. If you are interested in your son's views, and encourage him to refine and challenge his ideas through research, discussion and debate, your son will see the advantages of an enquiring mind. On the other hand, if you are only interested in marks, if you send him to his room to read and work alone while you watch TV or go out - he will feel frustrated, and not really appreciate the value of learning.

In addition to the class work which English teachers at Homebush Boys' have prepared, presented and tested in class, once again this year, teachers have spent their own time preparing and supporting extra curricular activities. It is these activities which develop the skills of many of our most enthusiastic and talented students. Mr Klein, Mr Wills, Mr Koff and Ms Gardener have spent lunchtimes before and after school hours training their debating and public speaking teams. For the first time in many years these teams have included students from Years 7 to 12.

Ms Parkin has trained all our Year 8 students in the skills of Commedia del Arte, spending many Friday lunchtimes rehearsing some volunteers for a performance afternoon. Ms Pather has again run the English Competition giving our students the opportunity to pit their language skills against those of thousands of other students from the Pacific region. Ms Roberts and Mr Groves have coordinated Year 12 courses - ensuring that Year 12 assessment tasks ran smoothly and that students who changed courses or missed lessons were given catch - up lessons and tasks. Ms Turai Kiss has been responsible for easing our Year 7 students into the rigours of high school, while Ms Lindstrom has helped all Year 7 students understand the school reading programme. All teachers of Year 12 have spent many extra hours giving revision lessons before and after school. Homebush Boys' High is the only school I know of where students get so much free out of school hours (even during the holidays!) English tutoring.

Finally to spotlight reading, language and expression, Week 10 of term three was dedicated across the school to "English Week". Mr Greene, Mr Hilliard, Ms Lewis and Mr Mitchell all read excerpts, from their favourite novels, over the P.A. System during Roll Call. Teachers from all faculties in the school, wrote poems based on photographs. (Look for these poems printed elsewhere in this issue.) Students were asked to identify these poetic geniuses in a "Guess the Author" competition. Literature prizes were awarded across the forms and each day general knowledge quizes took place. There were many outstanding academic results gained during the year.









# INDUSTRIAL ARTS

What is good about Industrial Arts? Much in education involves routine procedures for solving problems and rote learning of facts, figures or rules. When tasks are practical, processes must be understood before success is possible.

Concepts unique to Industrial Arts are those concerned with measurements and the behaviour of materials, when worked. Familiarity with a large range of hand and power tools is also developed. The emphasis on design has been increased and broadened so that students now have more input into size, shape, function and finish of most practical projects, within set parameters. Decision making and evaluation of the finished project are now very important aspects of all practical work.

Our subjects continue to be popular. The introduction of Computer Studies and Food Technology in Year 9, will probably make the choices available second to none amongst similar Comprehensive Boys' High Schools.

Next year in Year 9, students' elective choices have given us more numbers than ever. We will have classes in Electronics (2), Computers (2), Technical Drawing (2), Food Technology (1), Wood Technics (1) and Metal Technics (1). This virtually means that most of Year 8 this year have chosen TAS subjects.

What does worry us, however, is that in the near future Australia will have a shortage of skilled tradesmen, especially in the Wood and Metal trades. Where are they going to come from - overseas? Surely we should train our own. New initiatives are in train for 1998 that may encourage our junior students to choose the more traditional subjects in future.

Last year results at the H.S.C. were encouraging with many outstanding performances. Three students (11 candidates) were in the top percentile band in Engineering Science, and also another three students were in the next 10%. Mr Shearsby's dedication paid dividends.

The diverse projects of the sixteen candidates in Design and Technology must have been hard to assess. This was my class and perhaps one of the most enjoyable of recent years. Their results were commendable. The Wild Things came good.

Metalwork has made a revival. Mr Sparrow's expert guidance has resulted in the production of some excellent work. Computer controlled lathework has enhanced the usual machining and fitting units. The Cannon and the Steam Engine are very popular projects

Electronics, as popular as ever, is not just a matter of putting Dick Smith's kits together. Students are given some input and can make anything as a major project that is within their scope. Mr Tserpes has made this subject his own and his students are producing excellent results.

Mr Coskerie and Mr Heiss tend to concentrate more on the Woodwork areas. Woodturning and machining are having a resurgence and new equipment has been purchased. Both teachers have experience in this area and we hope to encourage more students to take this subject as an elective for the School Certificate.

Technical Drawing, as usual, has produced some excellent potential designers. It is hoped that we may be able to get more access to computers so that Mr Coskerie's experience in Auto Cad can flow on to the students.

Our two new subjects, Computer Studies and Food Technology have proved a great success and my thanks go to Mr Sparrow and Ms Bol Bol. They have overcome the usual teething problems and shown with their dedicated and diligent approach that their students will have a sound grounding, if they wish to take these subjects for the H.S.C.

Thanks to Mr Lance Robertson for his work replacing me whilst I was on leave.

In general 1997 will be viewed as a success with new and exciting programs in consideration for next year.

### **LIBRARY**

In term 3 this year I had the pleasure of talking to the P&C about Information Technology.

Education depends on the communication of ideas, concepts, and applications between people. Technology has changed this communication many times over. Teacher Librarians are being faced with the demands of this technology. Libraries provide students with access to information and the Librarian works with students and teachers to improve information literacy.

At Homebush the library has always been at the forefront of introducing new technologies. At the moment we have a computerised library with 5 terminals where students can access our collection. In addition we have 3 CD ROM computers with printers and a internet computer with printer. The P & C purchased 3 of these computers and 4 of the printers for the library over the last 3 years. In 1998 we hope to add a network of another 5 computers with internet access.

1997 has once again been a successful year and thanks to all of those people who have made it so.

# **MATHEMATICS**

For the first time in many years there were no changes to the Mathematics staff. However Ms.Quelch was required to teach the additional Mathematics and Art classes.

A new Year 9 Mathematics Syllabus was introduced this year still with three levels - now called Advanced, Intermediate and Standard. The Mathematics faculty are looking forward to the changes to the 1998 School Certificate when the Reference Test which has been held early in August will be replaced by a test in November where the student is given his own result. During 1997 the Mathematics faculty continued with a number of activities including Mathematics Competitions and Field Study days.

**Mathematics Competitions** 

The impressive results of the Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians, The University of NSW Mathematics Competition are outlined in the Competition section of the Magazine.

Field Study Day

The Year 7 Field Study Day was held on Friday, 18th April at Airey Park. Students measured, weighed, timed and estimated the actions involved in running, jumping and throwing, as part of their own "Maths Olympics". The Champion Class was 7D.

On Tuesday, 15th August all of Year 8 were involved in a Mathematics Field Study Day at school which lasted two periods and involved practical work. A hands on Maths Show titled 'A World of Mathematics' consisting of twenty-five activities was brought to the school especially for the day. It was an excellent opportunity for students of all ability levels to participate in problem

solving based on 'hands on' displays and puzzles. It catered for all ability levels and generated a lot of interest and enjoyment, as the displays applied mathematics to real-life situations.

On Friday, 21st November Year 9 visited Australia's Wonderland for a Field Study Day organised by the Mathematics Association of NSW. The students enjoyed all days and found them challenging and different from their normal lessons.

# School Certificate and HSC results.

The 1997 School Certificate results were again impressive. In particular, 10MC and their teacher Mrs.Shadwick can be pleased with their excellent achievements in the Intermediate course.

The performance of our 1996 HSC candidates was again extremely impressive. Of the boys who completed the 4 unit course, three boys, Jason Trinh, Anthony Tran and Dhileepan Paskaranathan were placed in the top 10% in the 4 unit course and thirteen boys were in the top 10% of 3 unit.

Although our students have achieved exceptional HSC results Year 11 are strongly advised to heed advice and select a level of Mathematics commensurate with their ability. This is extremely significant now as students cannot change to or from Mathematics in Society or Mathematics in Practice after term 2 in Year 11. Despite persistent advice a number of Year 11 boys have been trapped in a course with which they cannot cope.

We hope that students find 1998 even more challenging than this year.

# **SOCIAL SCIENCES**

Again there were quite a few changes to the teaching staff in Social Sciences this year.

Ms Dwyer joined us to teach Social Science subjects, as well as English and History. She is a very welcome addition to the staff and has quickly established herself at Homebush. We wish her well and hope she has many happy years here. At the end of first term, Mr J Anderson, who was filling in for Ms Allan, was offered a permanent appointment at Bass High School, which he accepted. Mr Anderson made a real impression in the few terms he was here and will be missed by staff and students alike. Ms Chew was a most welcome addition during second term, and continues with us in Social Sciences for one day a week. Ms Allan made a welcome return at the beginning of third term and was welcomed back by students in all her classes.

We seem to go from strength to strength in the HSC exam with last year's results again being most gratifying. There were many outstanding performances. the need to count at least one unit of an HSIE subject towards the TER has given added significance to subjects offered in Social Sciences. Very high marks are obtainable by able student who put in the required work effort in humanities subjects and an excellent selection of these subjects is available at Homebush. Highlights of the 1996 HSC include:

\* 5 students (of 16 candidates) in the top percentile band in 2 unit Geography.

\* 4 (of 18) candidates in the top 10% in 2 unit Economics, with another 4 in the next 10%.

\* 13 (of 58) candidates in the top 10% in 2 unit Business Studies with another 5 in the next 10%.

\* 3 (of 15) candidates in the top 10% in 3 unit Business Studies.

These outstanding results were backed up by many students who performed very solidly and often exceeded their hopes and expectations.

The continued strong response by students to subjects offered by Social Sciences is very pleasing. In the senior school, Business Studies is strongly favoured, with 3 classes likely in the Preliminary Course next

year. Economics is enjoying something of a revival and there is a steady demand for Legal Studies and Geography, with one class each. In the junior school, Commerce rebounded in demand and will have four very large classes in Year 9 next year. Prospective changes to the junior curriculum, with the introduction of Australian Civics to complement the current History and Geography courses for School Certificate assessment, will no doubt have some impact on the courses offered and school structures. We do not know the full import of these changes as yet and there are to be a couple of years of trialling the assessment of the new Civics course before all schools need to introduce it.

Again I must pay tribute to some excellent classroom performances by students, not only in major public examination years, but right through the school. This was observed in test and exam results, in written and pictorial assignments, in fieldwork reports and in the general quality of normal book and class work. Work is regularly displayed in classrooms and the tone of each room is invariably enhanced by the high quality of the various pieces of work.

Classroom excellence was enhanced by a number of field studies and other extra-mural activities. These are always very popular with students, who respond very well while on the excursion and in the associated follow up report or worksheets. Geography is the major field work participant, with Year 7 going to both the Bicentennial Park and Ku-ring-gai National Park and Year 11 undertaking a three day study in the Kangaroo Valley - Nowra area; but there were several other studies, including Year 11 Legal Studies and Year 12 Geography. Thanks are due to all staff who had a hand in organising such enrichment. Although it adds greatly to the normal teaching load the benefits for students are manifest. Reports on various of these field work activities appear on other pages of this magazine.

# **VISUAL ARTS**

1997 was a very good year for Visual Arts. A great deal of excellent work was produced by all years covering everything from drawing, painting, printing, computer work, ceramics, photography, mixed media sculpture using sea life, Gothic gargoyles and much, much more.

Last year, under the guidance of Ms Mauer, Dung Lam reached an extremely high standard both in making artworks and studying works of art. His series of etchings depicting, through the use of poignant symbols, his journey from Vietnam to Sydney, was selected for the Art Express exhibition and display around the State. The work is currently on display at the Powerhouse Museum in Casula.

The Visual Arts Faculty continues to be innovative in its programming and the standard of the students works also continues to improve. Many of the boys' works were represented in various public shows in our local area: the two important ones being at Westfield and Burwood Plazas. Andrew Ferguson, Peter Sebstian, Okan Tufanoglu and Mark Vulic painted a large mural on building hoardings at Strathfield Plaza earlier this year. Several schools were asked to paint murals on the hoardings and the Homebush work was judged as the best. The Strathfield Educational Resource Centre still retains works from some of our past HSC students and keeps them on permanent display. The annual exhibition, set up by the Art staff was a great success, as was the exhibition of Major Works in the hall. This year's Year 12 classes, under the guidance of Ms Juska and Mr Rozen, maintained the school's high standard in submitted HSC Major Works. The works of Jimmy Luk and Guolai Huang were selected for consideration for this year's Art Express exhibition. Approximately 15,000 major works were assessed this year and, of those,1000 were selected for consideration for Art Express; and of those only about 250 will be finally chosen for the exhibition. Congratulations to Jimmy and Guolai.

Photography continues to be a popular course and all of the photographic work hanging on the walls of the school has been donated by students doing either Photography or Art. Several of our Year 10 boys painted a mural at Strathfield Plaza on a hoarding which was put up while refurbishing was being carried out. They designed the mural as a group effort and, using house paint supplied by the Plaza, produced a work that far exceeded their expectations and which was commended by all who saw it.

The full range of artistic activity is carried out in this school mainly because of the talent of the art teachers, and their dedication to their subject and to the artistic development of the student body. Changes amongst the staff included Ms Quelch, who replaced Ms Musarra, and who has expertise in many areas, especially computer work, and next year will be running the Visual Design course specialising in computer graphic and design as related to the Visual Arts.

Jordan Cho and David Nguyen of Year 9 participated in an Art workshop at Campbelltown Art Gallery where they were involved with the theme of *Reflections*. The boys made leather masks and helped organise an exhibition. # **Old Boys**

# BACK IN 1936

I was in First Year at Summer Hill Boys High School in 1936 when both Summer Hill and Petersham High Schools were combined to form Homebush Boys High School. The headmaster was Mr Roberts and the Deputy was Mr McKilligan.

The classroom I was in at Summer Hill was built of timber and adjacent to the Headmaster of the Primary School's classroom. At change of periods teachers had to leave the High School and walk across the Primary playground which took some time. You can imagine the 'goings on' of the students between periods.

The transition to Homebush Boys in 1936 was like moving to a palace though some of the older boys had some misgivings at first.

For some short time there was friction between the Petersham and Summer Hill students with each group occupying different corners of the playground. When the 'houses' were formed and sport commenced the friction decreased. Like all schools though, numerous individual fist fights occurred, always behind the toilet block.

The houses were named after early explorers:Blaxland, Wentworth, Lawson, Sturt, Oxley and Mitchell. We were assigned to each according to the first letter of our surnames

Mason Park and Airey Park in Homebush and Cintra Park, Concord were the venues for cricket and football. The Sydney Cricket Ground was used for the yearly High Schools Athletic competition. Homebush was always at the forefront and always had the largest number of competitors and supporters - always a great day. The school's war cry seeemed to be forever sounding.

I can only remember one excursion and that was a visit to Everleigh Railway Workshop at Redfern: a visit I will never forget. Steam, smoke and noise on a very hot day! How times have changed.

I had only one visit to the Headmaster's office and it wasn't a pleasant one. Our English teacher in Second Year was a Mr Day and during the change of periods I drew a daisy on the blackboard and added, 'Daisy, Daisy, give me your answer do,' words from a song of the day. Mr Day did not take to it very kindly. I had to own up or the class was going to be 'kept in' after hours. Hence a visit to the Headmaster's office when he found me standing in the corridor outside the classroom. He gave me 'six of the best'.

On another occasion a couple of the students attached very fine wire to the duster and the blinds on the windows with expert precision. When the maths teacher reached for the duster on a few occasions, blinds were mysteriously rising and falling. He took a very dim view of this and a procession to the headmaster followed.

I'm proud to say that my two sons, Kevin and Jeffrey, were also students, and prefects, at Homebush Boys High in the early Sixties and I accompanied them to celebrate the 'Old Boys Reunion' on the occasion of the school's 60th anniversary: an occasion I enjoyed immensely.

Best wishes to student and teachers and thank you for the opportunity to write a few words about the past. I hope they will be of some interest. I have enclosed a photo of 2H in 1937. I am holding the sign.

We made our own fun and this school was a very happy school for most of us particularly as Homebush from the start was a great sports school and participation in sporting activities was greatly encouraged by the masters. As to football, the predominant code was Rugby League until someone saw the light late in 1937 and some of us were introduced to the game they 'play in heaven' although it was not until the school received full high school status that Rugby was played officially.

But I must tell you of the steam train. Those of us that lived on the Bankstown line had to get an electric train - now known as a *red rattler* - to Bankstown where an ancient steam train was waiting for us with engine

puffing away in readiness to take us on our daily journey to school. The reason the steam train ran was that the loop line between Bankstown and Lidcombe was not electrified. The old carriages were equipped with toilets with rolls of toilet paper. I will leave it to your imagination.... a steam train puffing along the tracks with rolls of toilet paper streaming from the windows of each carriage.

The train was also an excuse to avoid morning periods that we did not like by claiming that we had missed the train. The first time I tried it I was caught out. It was then that I met the Headmaster, Boss Roberts, face to face. He made a striking impression on me. 'Six of the best!' - three on each hand. I met him some years later and reminded him of the caning and asked him if he remembered the occasion. He replied that he did not recall the event saying, 'My dear Paton, during my career I must have caned one thousand boys. Why should I remember you?' To which I replied,

'Because I cried.'

# **OBITUARY**

John Shaw 1940 - 1997

Dr John Shaw was one of Australia's finest clinical pharmacologists. He was educated at Strathfield Primary School and **Homebush Boys High School** and graduated in Medicine from Sydney University in 1965.

Dr Shaw's career included research work in the laboratories of Professor Paul Korner in Sydney and Professor W.S.Peart in London. He was a Fellow in Medicine at Johns Hopkins University in America, clinical pharmacologist at Melbourne University, and first Professor of Clinical Pharmacology at Sydney University. He worked at Prince Alfred Hospital, Royal Melbourne Hospital, the Repatriation General Hospital (Concord), the Royal Alexandria Hospital for Children, and Royal North Shore Hospital. He held the position of Director of the NHF until 1994 when he was appointed medical director of Merck Sharp and Dohme (Australia).

Dr Shaw was a man of immense energy and imagination who managed to combine the roles of physician, academic researcher and teacher, and active participant in the pharmaceutical industry, nationally and internationally, with verve and integrity.

'Sometimes his broad picture approach and internationalist philosophy disquieted less visionary and more cautious colleagues, but his tireless dedication ensured that medical scientisits overseas were constantly reminded, not just from articles in journals, of the significance and richness of Australian laboratory and clinical pharmacology.' (SMH Aug. 1997).

# THE NEW SCHOOL

I was transferred from Summer Hill Intermediate High School in 1936 for the last term of Third Year. It was at this time that students and staff of Petersham and Summer Hill were brought together to form a new school known as Homebush Boys Junior High School going to the Intermediate level.

The third year classes of the two schools were halved and amalgamated. The school teachers of a particular subject came, from seriously influenced the teaching of each class for the final term. The order of the curriculum had been set out differently in each school which meant that at Homebush for 50% of each class one term of the subject had not been taught. The science labs were not set up in 1936 so practical work was not possible.

The prefects had a most difficult time trying to control the classes between periods as many fights would break out between students from the two schools and the walls were regularly splattered with fruit, mostly pears.

However we did our best to create a new school of whose achievements we could be justly proud.

The unpopularity of the Headmaster, especially among the Third Year students, was made obvious when he left the Third year Farewell Evening and drove over a proud piece of fence timber at the gateway on four flat tyres!

I was proud to send my two sons to HBHS where they acquitted themselves very well scholastically and in the Army Cadet Unit. It was a great pity to see the trophies with their names on destroyed in the hall fire.

The E-shaped building on Bridge Road was a completely new building. At the northern end of the complex there was an open garden, a pergola, and a tennis (a rose garden) court which were probably part of the original home on the estate. On the Monday we began lessons at Homebush and the playground at the back was waist high with paspalum grass. It was soon mown down with student activity at recess and at lunchtime.

I was a Prefect in 1937, and also captain of the Athletics Team which represented the school at the annual PSAAA Athletics Carnival that year. In the hurdles event I broke a record in a heat and was 'chaired' off the field by fellow students. Sadly, I was just beaten in the final when the record was broken again! I won the Intermediate Cup for Athletics at Homebush in 1937.

Under the direction of the English master, Mr Hoffman, I also performed in Shakespeare's 'Twelfth Night'. I took the role of Malvolio. I recall also, planting trees in the grounds on Arbor Day, one in front of the main building towards the southern end and another down the southern boundary of the school site.

Absolute horror from Bleach.


'You mean he cut off all their....'

# **MATHEMATICS COMPETITIONS 1997**

Our pupils have an outstanding record in Mathematics competitions. Pupils were again involved in Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians, The University of NSW Mathematics Competition and the Australian Mathematics Competition.

Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians
During the year boys from Years 8 to 10 were involved
with the Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians
under the guidance of Mr Ha. It has two stages
commencing with a three week Challenge in March
consisting of six problems done at home.

Thirty-two boys received certificates for the first stage. In an outstanding performance Alexey Taran and Lin Chen of Year 10, Sumanthiran Retnavel of Year 9 and Colman Yu of Year 8 were awarded High Distinctions placing them in the top 8% of the talented students that enter this prestigious competition. Alexey Taran actually was awarded maximum marks and Lin Chen lost only one mark. Thirteen boys were awarded Credit Certificates and sixteen boys received Certificates of Participation..

Outstanding results were achieved by seventeen boys who were involved in the demanding second or Enrichment stage which required students to work through notes and attempt twelve problems during Second and Third Terms. Alexey Taran of Year 10 achieved a perfect score for the second time and was awarded a High Distinction. Menaka Sirisena and Navneet Kumar of Year 8 were awarded Distinctions. Credit Certificates were awarded to Sumanthiran Retnavel and Mugunthan Kandasamy of Year 9 and Jason Xu, Sharangan Kangarathan and Colman Yu of Year 8.

University of NSW Mathematics Competition

On Monday, 16th June two boys - Alexey Taran of Year 10 and Sumanthiran Retnavel of Year 9 - entered the University of NSW Mathematics Competition. Alexey Taran was placed fifteenth in the state and received a monetary prize and Certificate - an excellent effort in this prestigious competition.

Australian Mathematics Competition

Earlier in the year organisers of The 1997 Australian Mathematics Competition released the positions of the top students in the state. Excellent achievements by *Bin Wang* then of Year 11 who was placed 49th and *Alexey Taran* then of Year 9 was placed was 67th.

This year the Australian Mathematics Competition was held on Tuesday, 29th July. Aimed at making maths fun, this competition is designed with the average student in mind. It also identifies those with exceptional ability, some of whom go on to represent Australia at the International Mathematical Olympiad. The results were very impressive. 698 students entered the Competition. One student gained a Prize, six students received a Certificate of High Distinction, 81 obtained a Distinction and 275 achieved a Credit easily breaking the record of 223 Credits in 1993. All entrants received at least a Certificate of Participation and an individual performance report.

Year 7 student *Tommy Chen* was the Prize Winner placing him in the top 0.5% of the state. He received a cheque, pin and certificate for his effort.

Tommy Lo of Year 7, Menaka Sirisena, Mark Wong and Kai Zhao of Year 8, Edward Fan of Year 9 and Henry

Yang of Year 11 were the High Distinctions recipients placing them in the top 2% in the state. Over 530, 000 secondary students entered the Competition with a Prize or High Distinction Award a rare and prestigious achievement. Boys are advised to include their certificate in their job portfolio as it can only be of benefit when seeking employment.

This year the organisers again released standardised results for the best pupils allowing comparison between years within a school and consequently identifying the school's best entrant. The best standardised results achieved were as follows:





This year a record 443,000 students entered the Competition held annually throughout Australia, New Zealand and the Asia-Pacific region.



# The Science Show

On the 17th and 18th of April we went on a Science excursion to Canberra. We saw many exhibitions and interesting places and my favourite was Questacon, however I have to talk about the "Fire and Explosions Show."

The show started with a demonstration of why air is important to fire. This was done by blowing icing sugar into the air through a flame which increased in size and then doing the same to a pile of icing sugar which only singed. This was because in the air there is more oxygen to help the flame. Three main things are needed for fire; air energy and fuel.

The scientist then put a lighted match on a plate, placed a jar on top and then filled the plate with water. Suddenly the flame went out and the jar sucked up the water. This was because the candle had burned all the oxygen and as the air in the jar cooled, it contracted and sucked the water in.

The man's final experiment showed us why silos with metal tops are better than those with concrete tops. The principle was the same as the flame and icing sugar. A milo can represented the silo, a candle was placed inside and some icing sugar. Then when he blew into a tube at the side, the first time with the lid on loosely nothing much happened. When he put the lid on tightly the top blew off with a big bang high into the air. This was because there would always be flour in the air of the silo and any spark or flame could set it off. This was my favourite experiment.

Over all the show was good except it was a little short.

# **International Science School at ISS**

The International Science School (ISS) is a biannual, two week fully residential school held at the University of Sydney. It is run by the Science Foundation for Physics within the University of Sydney.

This year the school was from 6th July to 19th July. After checking in at St John's College on the first Sunday, I was informed that most of the social events were organised by the student helpers from Young Scientists of Australia (YSA). Then it was time to socialise, where everybody basically went around people hunting. By 6pm most people had arrived and we were greeted by some of the coordinators.

After the very first meal at the college, I went around meeting the overseas students from New Zealand, US, UK, Thailand, Malaysia, Singapore and Japan. It took a few days to get to know 138 people and to make life easier everyone wore a name tag. Student helpers were always armed with a permanent marker to write on people's foreheads if they didn't wear the tags (And they really did it.)

The *official* first Monday began with a group photo of everyone in school uniform, followed by speeches from chancellors, directors and founders of different committees. Then came the very first lecture on *The Nature of Light*, by Professor Dick Collins, the head of the School of Physics at Sydney Uni, the director of the Science Foundation for Physics and the director of ISS '97! What's more, he's an old boy of Homebush, and he supervised me for Work Experience!

Professor Collins started off with simple electrostatics, then he brought in all these calculus and equations and wonderful, magical, universal constants out of nowhere. In the meantime, everyone's face went blank. After all, he did cram twenty three second year uni lectures into fifty minutes.

All the other lectures throughout the rest of the two weeks were on different aspects and applications of light - from lasers and liquid crystals to photosynthesis and being blind. The lectures were given by renowned lecturers from universities around the globe. One of the best lectures was on everyday science by Dr Karl Kruszelnicki, who is one of the best science popularisers.

Activities were organised for every morning and afternoon on weekdays. These included lab tours and hands on experiments and a lot of us had fun *playing* with all the lasers, chemicals, computers, and other weird high tech stuff. We also visited ANSTO (Australian Nuclear Science and Technology Organisation), where we visited their particle accelerators and electron microscopes.

One of the best activities though, was the YSA Science Show. They fiddled with various chemicals and equipment which demonstrated the concept of *light*. They lit huge soap bubbles, made exploding sounds by burning Hydrogen gas in a way which was quite loud and had a very strong smell. The thing that I found most amazing was that when they mixed two or three chemicals it formed a solution which when swirled clockwise turned brownish, and when swirled the other way, became totally clear. It was quite exciting to watch.

If you think these camps are full of learning and are dead boring, you're totally wrong! The best thing about these camps is the social events. By the way, there were a few more girls than guys at ISS this year. The main social events were on the weekend right in the middle of the two week duration with activities organised outside of Sydney as well as on the harbour.

The other events included a Trivia Contest, Concert Night (where people presented a performance, and some were both funny and ridiculous), indoor rock climbing, pool night, movies, and just wandering around the city with the *outsiders*.

Overall the ISS was really good and a great opportunity for making lots of friends. After the camp, the number of pen pals I had jumped from one to twenty five, and email pals from five to fifty. I received over fifty emails within a week from interstate and international connections.

When I applied for the ISS I hoped I'd get in, but I never thought I really would. So if you ever get a chance, give it a shot. It doesn't have to be a science camp, but a camp related to any interest you acquire. "Nothing is impossible", as long as the basic laws of science still hold.

I would like to thank Mr Everett and Mr Greene for informing me about ISS and writing the references for me. I would also like to thank Mrs Crossan for helping me with the application. Without their kind help I would not have been able to have such a great experience at ISS.

# National Water Week 19th to 25th October 1997

In a recent conference held in Geneva, Switzerland, hosted by The United Nations, the success of the human race was debated. One of the professors hypothesized that if a person from another planet came and visited us, he would probably judge us on how successful we have been in feeding our own population. It is a fact that we as humans cannot even provide each of our own population, that's nearly 6 billion people, with a single glass of fresh drinking water.

National Water Week 1997 was held between 19th and 25th of October. Several workshops and activities were held all around Sydney. The National Water Week Conservation concert was held in Bi-centennial Park and was attended by the Wiggles and other celebrities. Sydney Opera House hosted the National Water Week Youth Speaks Forum where youth representatives of each state and territory across Australia talked about what their local community was doing to help conserve water.

In the facilitated panel discussion some of the representatives asked why the government did not initiate programs such as National Water Week. It is attempting to address some of the water-related problems facing Australia. These include:-

- 1) Droughts throughout Australia which have severely depleted the water supply of many towns and
- 2) Introduction of water restrictions which has brought home to us all the scarcity of this valuable resource and hence the need for water conservation.

Solutions already being put in place include:-

1) Change in community attitude towards a more

environmentally sustainable use and re-use of resources.

2) Those managing water supplies are coming under more pressure to reduce draw off from rivers and to increase environmental flows.

3) Development of range of more water efficient fixtures to help minimize usage and conserve water.

4) Development of water conservation practices both in design of facilities and in their operation.

5) Education of the public to value this resource and not to pollute it.

6) Government setting up services to assist major water uses. For example the Department of Public Works and Services seeks to encourage all NSW government projects to be water wise, that is to incorporate efficient use of water in every aspect of a project and to facilitate the incorporation of innovative solutions and technology for more efficient water usage and cost effective recycling of waste water.

Another question asked was, "Why was the youth forum organised when we can't even vote on the future of Australia and what role do we have to play?"


The response to this was, "The involvement of young people in this, and indeed any environmental project has an astounding effect on the youth in the community. For all of us who may have once thought that there was nothing, that they stood mute to the power forces of the world, this project has sparkled a self realisation that we could have an effect on our environment. Student involvement has shown the solution, the leadership to so many people who were confused by the issues facing our environment today. We hope that our efforts will inspire others to go on to bigger and greater things."






















# A YEAR LESS ORDINARY

While the remainder of her colleagues were underwhelmed by, but were nevertheless enjoying, the occasional summer sunshine, Mrs Lacek spent her time in snow-bound Poland, where she had been invited to attend courses and workshops at the Pedagogical University of Krakow with followers of a new program of language teaching

Mrs Lacek is a former student of the university and she won the prestigious Red Rose prize for the best university student in the late 1960's.

On her arrival in Krakow, Mrs Lacek was asked to conduct some of the lectures and concluding discussions, which surprised and delighted her.

Mrs Lacek was indeed prepared and equipped to give some talks, but she expected those to be about her beloved adoptive country, not educational methods.

With the collapse of communism, Poland is undergoing widescale economic, political and social changes, which are forcing education systems and educators' attitudes to change and embrace the emergence of democratic rule and thought. Interest in education systems which incorporate these ideals is at a peak. This was evident in a three hour talkback session on Radio Lublin, in Silesia.

After a half-hour talk given by Mrs Lacek, she responded to three hours of questions about Australian education. Questions about delinquency and discipline; sex education and respect; drugs and problems of youth. The restraints and constraints of strict etiquette were highlighted in the expressions of disbelief that Australian teachers call their principals by their first names.

Mrs Lacek soothed those educators and parents who expressed



## The Power of the Media

The media has a big influence on the public's behaviour and attitudes. The control they have over the public is used to invade privacy, excessively exploit, mislead and sensationalise, thus altering people's thoughts and opinions of the world and incidents that occur. The Public has no control over how they see the world.

The media invades the privacy of many famous people to make money. This is a misuse of power as it takes away the rights of others to have a private life. An example of this is the very recent incident where Princess Diana and Dodi El Fayed were killed in a car accident while being chased by photographers on motor-bikes. Everyone has a right to privacy and therefore one can see how the media is taking advantage of its position.

The media excessively exploits current events and certain products. Many current world events such as Olympic Games, Commonwealth Games and air shows are excessively exploited on the television and in newspapers. Also certain products such as *Windows 95* are given extra attention because the company gives the media groups endorsements.

Some major events don't even get mentioned in the media. For example; the 1997 Jewish Games were not even mentioned in the news until people from Australia died in a bridge collapse. The media only shows what they want to show.

The media often gives misleading information. When they are gathering information for a report they usually interview a few people and sometimes make up facts because there is not enough information. An example of this was the Thredbo Disaster. Many theories on the cause of the landslide were given, but most were not right. The media presents misleading information and though everyone can see how wrong this is they cannot do anything about how it and just accept the facts they are given.

The media groups use sensationalism in their reports. When a tragedy happens they take advantage of people's emotions to keep people watching television or listening to the radio. An example of this is when Martin Bryant shot thirty five people in a small town in Tasmania. The television stations keep people watching by taking advantage of their emotions and feelings.

The media, television stations, radio, newspapers, magazines and even the internet have a power which they use excessively to invade the privacy of others, exploiting something or someone, misleading people which alters their view and judgement of other people or groups of people and takes advantage of people's emotions.

The media controls the way the public behaves and spends their money, their thoughts and judgements.

The Queens Trust National Capital Seminar is an annual event held in Canberra. The aim of the seminar is to educate participants on the processes of Government and governing institutions in Australia. Participants were flown to Canberra and we stayed at Canberra Grammar School.

Before I went to Canberra I had read a past participant's account of the Seminar. She had said that all who attended the seminar experienced the full spectrum of human emotions. Not until I had returned from Canberra did I realise how true this was. It is hard to describe in words the way in which the seminar impacted upon me.

The seminar drew participants from all over the country; each state represented proportionally to population. This provided for some friendly state rivalries, particularly between NSW and Victoria. Each participant was a Year 11 student. All one hundred of us totally different persons, but having an incredible, unique bond between us. Lifetime friendships were made between people from totally different backgrounds.

The first day was spent learning about the workings of Australia's constitution. The constitution is the document that outlines what governments can and can't do - so it's a pretty important document. We visited the High Court, which is the body responsible for interpreting the constitution. We watched a session for about 20 minutes and came out not having a clue what had just happened - all sorts of legal jargon was being mumbled by old men wearing funny wigs.

There was an interesting debate about whether or not Australia should become a Republic, between the President of NSW Young Liberals (Republican) and a Liberal Member of Parliament (Monarchist). We then headed for Parliament House and quickly took over one of the Committee rooms. We had many interesting (and some boring) people talk to us there. Former Democrats leader Cheryl Kernot talked to us about ethics in politics and how corrupt and horrible the major parties were, the day before she decided to desert the

Democrats and join the Labor Party. A young Senator, Bill O'Chee, from Queensland came and talked to us for half an hour about how wonderful he was and how hard he worked.

Senator Amanda Vanstone, who was at the time Minister for Education, tried to explain the government's and her decisions in relation to Education. Nearly all seminar participants were outraged with her attitudes towards her job and us. We heard rumours that day that she was about to be fired as Education Minister, and the next week she was.

Senators Kate Lundy and Natasha Stott Despoja (the youngest Members of Parliament) talked to us about youth involvement in politics and political parties. The ACT deputy Chief Minister talked to us about the ACT Heroin Trial. We watched question time and had a tour of restricted areas of Parliament House.

We also had speakers on Aboriginal Reconciliation, The Public Service, the Media (Lateline presenter Maxine McKew) and a speech by Dick Smith (of Dick Smith Electronics). We had trips to embassies and High Commissions, the Art Gallery, the War Memorial, Questacon and many other places. Perhaps the most enjoyable event of the week was a reception at the Governor-Generals home (Government House). The property was incredible and by the time we left everyone had decided that they had to become the next Governor-General.

The week was without a doubt one of the most memorable of my life and provided me with a unique opportunity to see first hand the workings of government in Australia. All expenses were paid for, and for that I am thankful to the Queen's Trust, which is a philanthropic, apolitical (it isn't biased on any issues, political or otherwise) organisation that paid for the whole thing. All students in the junior school with even a remote interest in government should consider applying to attend in future years. You don't have to know a lot about politics/government. Some participants were there because of sporting, musical, science and other abilities.

I wanted to work as a psychologist but was placed as a welfare worker at an organisation called the Wayside Chapel in Kings Cross.

Finally the big day came! I opened my eyes in the morning at exactly half past six. I got up and had a quick shower. It's not my usual habit to have a shower in the morning, as I prefer mine after school. After the shower I had a small breakfast and then ran to catch the 7:50 'Express to city' train. I reached Kings Cross station at around 8:35a.m.

Following 10 minutes of confusion I finally reached the Wayside Chapel. Immediately I was met by Iris Willoughby, the person 'in charge' of me and she sent me to look around the place. I looked at the plaques which were glued on the wall and read a few pamphlets. From that I learned that this place was a non-profitable organisation which was dedicated to look after less privileged people, like homeless people and drug addicts. Later I was told that I couldn't do welfare work because I was too young and hadn't completed a counselling course. All volunteer workers have to complete a 12 week counselling course.

On the first day I worked in the Op Shop where a lot of people that I served had a brief chat with me about their lives. There was also a lot of handshakes.

Tuesday I was again assigned to the Op Shop where I realised that the profession I wanted to take up would be very difficult. I was told not to get too attached to the people I dealt with as I would end up feeling sorry for them and they would probably take advantage of the situation. The underprivileged people that I met were just like you and I. To understand this I had to be less judgmental and more understanding.



While waiting he told me about his addiction to drugs and how he stole money to feed his addictions. He lost his job, his relatives and most important of all his dignity. 






# Working as a team.

## The Greenhouse Effect

The greenhouse effect is the global warming of the earth. Gases such as carbon dioxide, methane and nitrous oxide are major contributors to global warming.

When the sun shines on the earth, the heat goes through the atmosphere and reaches the ground. The ground then reflects the heat towards the atmosphere. But when there are greenhouse gases up there the heat is trapped and therefore the earth warms up. However if there were no greenhouse gases at all, the earth would freeze up.

Some of the effects of global warming could be disastrous while in some countries the effects could be beneficial. For example, one effect of global warming is a rise in sea level due to the Polar ice caps melting and the resulting expansion of water. This would be disastrous for coastal cities, but beneficial for areas like central and other parts of Australia. This would bring rain to these areas and bring life.

The 'El Nino' effect could also be disastrous for the world. The 'El Nino' effect brings droughts to Australia and floods to parts of America and the west coast of South America. As well, the earth would heat up and plants and animals would have to adapt to the temperature rise.

The Carbon Cycle is a term used to describe where the carbon comes from and where the carbon goes. Trees are like carbon pumps: they absorb carbon that comes from cars, industry and other sources and they store the carbon in their trunks. Each time a tree is cut down, there is one less pump to absorb carbon and when trees are burnt they release the carbon back into the atmosphere. With a stadium full of trees being cut down every second, and then burnt, there is no wonder why there is such a concern for saving trees.

As well there are microscopic plants floating around in the sea that also absorb carbon being released due to underwater volcanic activity. But these microscopic plants are being destroyed due to their sensitivity to ultra-violet rays from the sun and holes in the ozone layer.

To stop carbon accumulating in the atmosphere, more vegetation should be planted and there should be stricter laws on emissions and inefficient industries. The Kyoto Conference in 1987 was aimed at decreasing the amount of greenhouse gases being emitted by making industries more efficient and introducing more stringent laws.

- 4. The willow tree was removed from the soil and both the tree and the soil were weighed again.




It was found that the tree had increased its mass by 75 kilograms yet the soil had lost only 60 grams of its mass.





Mock Trial is a competition established by the Law Society of NSW for students in the senior school. A team of six students each have a role from barrister to court clerk. They compete against schools in and out of the area. The trials are prepared and they last for about three hours.

The 1997 season was conducted under the expert advice of solicitor and mentor, Michael Byrnes. He instructed the group on ways to approach the case. Teacher, Craig Anderson, organised the team and answered some of the questions the students had.

Participants included Nick Kavadias, Christopher Chan, Laurence King, Pratheepan Thevadasan, Prashanth Shanmugan, Hong Nguyen, Dinesh Purswani and Aditya Khana. All hope for some sort of legal career.

Training for Mock Trial involves looking over case material and preparing either a defence or a prosecution.

Both of the barristers prepare questions and opening and closing paragraphs. The witnesses memorise statements and the clerk helps with the running of the court.

The 1997 season was a solid one. The first trial against Burwood Girls' High School was a success and a lot of valuable experience was gained. The second trial, against Auburn Girls' High School, was an unfortunate loss. But round three against Mr Anderson's old school, Plumpton High School, was a win. Round four was make or break, and unfortunately, Newman College High School was the better side. The following rounds were unfortunately closed off.

Mock Trial is certainly a very exciting activity, and one that takes a lot of dedication and preparation. The team would like to thank teacher Mr Craig Anderson and solicitor and guide Michael Byrnes for their expert advice without which the team would have been destitute.

Because of Neil and timely contributions from all the other members of the team we were able to defeat Macquarie by the narrowest of margins 42-40 to become Zone Champions.
















#### 15 YEARS BASKETBALL
