




Homebush Boys' High School is always a place for enormous achievement and activity and as a result it is a considerable challenge to capture the essence of the work carried out by the students, staff and the general educational community. However once again, this magnificent 2003 edition of the School Magazine represents a lasting memory of the year which has featured so many outstanding achievements in all facets of school life.

The school prides itself on catering for the diverse needs of a large number of students from a variety of different backgrounds. The magazine contributions capture the essence of a number of the many opportunities which are available to all boys. Such activities as the Tournament of the Minds, public speaking and debating, special excursions, enrichment programs, mentoring, special workshops at universities and similar institutions. Involvement in the many subject-based competitions is a growing part of the extra-curricular events found on the school calendar and participation this year was significantly higher in most subject areas.

The 2003 HSC results were indeed very pleasing. Martin actually attained a 100.00 UAI which places him amongst the top 21 students in NSW. These boys will no doubt be able to follow their goals to attend University and study courses which are of interest to them. Comparing school course means with state means the following subjects recorded average marks above the state cohort: Ancient History, (Standard), English Chemistry, Biology. (Advanced), English as a Second language, Industrial Technology and Maths Ext 2. Congratulations to all the 2003, Year 12 students and we trust your further learning will continue to be satisfying and bring enjoyment to you wherever you decide to continue your education.

Sport is an integral part of the Homebush Boys' curriculum and this year has proven to be one of the best ever in terms of participation and success with our grade teams competing in the NW Metropolitan Zone. The school were summer sports champions and second in the winter competition. As well the school won the zone athletics and swimming carnivals and came second in the cross-country events. Consequently the school was judged the 2003 Champion Sports School for the zone. Many of the successful moments are captured in the magazine.

The magazine represents the combined efforts of a number of staff and in particular I would like to recognise Ms Juska, Mr Hilliard and Mr Doenau for their outstanding editorial and publishing work, Mr Evans for the co-ordination of the sports reports and Mr Brawn for his excellent photographic skills which the students always appreciate. Homebush becomes a Lighthouse School

For me the highlight of 2003 was the school's recognition for excellence and innovation in literacy when we were awarded a grant from the Federal government for Boys' Education Lighthouse projects. Our submission was developed by a subcommittee of the Literacy and Numeracy team and this committee was led by the talented and hardworking Ms Christine Wyness. Ms Wyness targeted "talking and listening" lessons for year 9 and all faculties were asked to design lessons to address these skills.

Maths designed a unit incorporating interview lessons; Geography and History did oral presentations; in Sport and Lifestyle students taught AFL skills and Visual Arts students engaged in game shows and quizzes. There were many other great ideas and faculties designed outstanding lessons. Staff and students were surveyed before and after the delivery of the lessons and responses indicated that the lessons highlighted that students enjoy hearing from other students during lessons. The ability to speak and listen effectively must be explicitly taught we feel sure that this program will encourage a move away from teacher centred lessons where appropriate.

The Federal Minister for Education, Dr Brendan Nelson, was so impressed with the Homebush submission that he chose Homebush as the site for the media launch of the Lighthouse program. He was accompanied on the day by Federal Member for Lowe, John Murphy and other dignitaries.

Coincidentally the "Big Arvo" television show had decided on the same day to film the "Teacher Challenge" segment of the show. Dr Brendan Nelson took the opportunity to meet the presenter of the show, the stunning Anna Choy.

The Big Arvo Teacher Challenge allowed a selection of talented Year 7 and 8 students who were entrants in the Harvey Norman Ozspell to pit their wits against the imposing intellect of History Head Teacher Mr Roger Doenau. All the best efforts of the students couldn't stump Mr "Dictionary" Doenau who was declared the winner by Anna Choy. It was a great experience for all concerned and a great surprise for me as Anna Choy had been one of my best Maths students at my former school.

Runners-up on our own turf! Oh so close in the Harvey Norman Ozspell competition 2003.

2003 was the second year of the Ozspell spelling competition and Homebush students have enthusiastically supported this literacy-based competition. Over 50 of the year 7, 8 and 9 students registered by purchasing the booklets containing over 3000 tricky words.

In Stage 1 on Tuesday 6 May students were required to complete a written task comprising of the spelling of 30 words including "melaleuca" and "Kabul". Students with 15 or more correct proceeded to the next stage.

Stage 2 was an oral competition on Monday 12 May. 18 competitors fought hard to be the school champion or one of the district finalists. In the end there can only be one champ - Jas Simran Singh narrowly defeated Danan Thilakanathan in a spell-off with Asef Islam making up the third member of the district team with all of the boys from year 8. So, on we went to the District final with this formidable team. I felt confident and so did the lads because this year the final was on our home turf. We were hosts to 10

other public and private schools.

The morning of the final, Thursday 22 May, was bright and clear and our team felt sharp. Success was very close but the fairy tale ending was not to be and our team. Asef fell to a very tough word in round 2 and proudly our depleted team battled on. Losing Jas in the next round left the diminutive Danan to carry the hopes of Homebush on his small but strong shoulders. It was only in round 7 that Danan fell victim to "kohl", the black powder so often used in makeup. Any other word would have been fine but the brave fellow took the loss manfully after all, it's not everyday you finish 2nd in this very talented field. It was a great day and Homebush won the teams event spelling more words correctly than any other team (9).

I wish to congratulate all entrants and I hope that they continue to be part of the competition in 2004. A large part of the success of the competition goes to the teachers who gave up their time to preparing and running the competition but special praise goes to Mr Neill Francis who did the very difficult job of pronouncer at the district final.

New Staff enhance Literacy at Homebush

We are very happy to have her join our Literacy and Numeracy Support team and the Learning Support team. Ms Edwards also coordinates our very successful community volunteer reading program.

Another vital link in the literacy education is the new Head Teacher English, Mr Cheiban Elaro. Mr Elaro was welcomed by staff and students in term 2 and his skills in English will be most valued by all. Mr Elaro's knowledge and experience belies his youth.

Premier's Reading Challenge continues to grow

Thanks to the hard work of Ms Jenelle Horiatopoulos the number of students who were successful at the Premier's Reading Challenge grew to 40 in 2003. Ms Horiatopoulos used the home room groups to stimulate interest in the Challenge in which students are challenged to read 20 books from a list devised by Premier Bob Carr. We look forward to even more students completing the Challenge in 2004.

Homebush Students Graduate from TAFE

At a celebratory lunch on Monday October 20, 22 of our finest year 10 and year 11 students graduated from the "TAFE Literacy Volunteer tutoring program".

All students in the program were taught the skills required to assist year 7 and year 8 boys in home rooms 20, 23 and 32 with their reading. The tutors are all wonderful

young men and they combined their academic training with their personal leadership skills and generosity to put their time into assisting young people, the tutees, with their reading.

Major Achievements in ICT

In 2003 Information and Communication technologies at Homebush grew in importance to the curriculum and in the size of the network. We were fortunate to be joined on staff by a qualified network administrator, Mr Ryan Chadwick. Mr Chadwick is a highly skilled and dedicated member of staff who also happens to be an ex-student. His work has enhanced the wonderful work of Mr Greg Lucas and Mr Greg Sheath.

Long awaited broadband internet access has finally been connected to the Homebush computer network. This fast access is part of the DET Computers in Schools Program (CISP) and has been provided by the company UECOMM.

This level access to the web enables on-line learning to be more successful and effective. Many staff and students frustrated by the excruciatingly slow access now find the 10 Mbps cable lightning fast. Administration will also be greatly facilitated by this installation as so much of today's communications and contacts are handled on-line.

New Computing Labs have been opened in the Creative and Performing Arts (CAPA) area. A major school


project has just been completed with two brand new computing labs:

- * Music Kiosk Room 45 vestibule consists of 5 computers running specialist music software


The cabling has been completed and the hardware has been delivered and all workstations are installed and locked down thanks to Mr Chadwick. This lab will be used to cater for the growing interest in photo-digital editing required in the visual arts and digital music production. The fact that the lab has been constructed in an Art room highlights the changes in student preferences and the growing need for the integration of technology.

The ICT team coordinated the Trial Computing Skills Assessment this year with 200 year 10 students sitting the exam on-line. This was only possible due to the high speed broadband internet connection that had been installed.

2004 is underway and Homebush continues to grow as a centre of excellence in the education of boys.

Imagine you are Captain Smith on the bridge of the Titanic. In your ever vigilant search for danger you spy an iceberg. Like a colossus rising from the water, the iceberg is a thing of beauty. A myriad of colours reflect in the moonlight against a pure white backdrop. We all know what happens next! The Titanic sinks to the bottom of the Atlantic because of the simple fact that only 10% of the iceberg can be seen above the waterline while 90% of it, with its enormous mass and sharp edges, lie beneath the surface, a constant danger to the unaware.

Schools are a bit like that! As the community makes judgements about school don't just concentrate on the iceberg above the surface, but understand how the 90% below the waves supports the whole structure.

I would like to tell you about our "iceberg ..." the iceberg we call Homebush Boys High School, as it sits in the Atlantic Ocean of hundreds of State and Private schools. There is much to report on in relation to the 10% above the surface which becomes the public face of the school.

The pursuit of academic excellence is the core activity of every school. Our goal is for every student to reach hispotential. The Higher School Certificate results for 2003 were outstanding. School Dux, Martin Feng, received a University Admissions Index of 100.00. The result meant Martin was ranked at number one in New South Wales, along with twenty other students who also received a UAI of 100.00. Martin was placed 5th in English ESL in NSW and 9th in Mathematics Extension 2. He also received a "Premier's Award for All Round Merit". The "Premier's Award" is given to students who score above 90 in each of their ten units of study. Martin was joined by Ketan Bhatt, Kevin Cheng and Phillip Chu, who also qualified for a "Premier's Award". Ashwin Gore and Sourabh Jain narrowly missed a similar award after scoring above 90 in nine of their units of study. Several students were ranked in the top ten in NSW in specific subjects, with Kevin Cheng placed 6th in English ESL, Harry Karadimas placed 10th in Industrial Technology, Kevin Jiang placed 8th in Information Technology and Alfred Selladurai place 1st in Tamil. The class of 2003 recorded a record total of 104 entries on the "Distinguished Achievers Merit List" as published in the daily press. James Kipriditis was placed first in Year 12 based on internal school assessment. We can always do better and that is our goal. It would be remiss of me not to mention the achievements of Greg McCaull. A keen and hardworking student, Greg had 100% attendance over his six years of high school ... imagine never missing a day at school!

The results from the HSC, School Certificate, ELLA (Literacy) and SNAP (Mathematics) "System's Testing" saw our student cohorts score well above state averages, reflecting their effort and the instruction they receive. Anthony Solaese was a responsible School Captain who, along with, Phillip Havea, Sourabh Jain and Junji Tai, received Granville District Awards for "Excellence in Student Achievement".

Junji Tai can be well satisfied with his performance as a "Bushy Boy" ... Junji's contribution to his academic studies, his involvement in sport, student leadership and community service resulted in an impressive list of achievements A Granville District Award, a Commendation from the Order of Australia Association, and the Young Citizen of the Year for the Strathfield Municipality. Like Junji, the students who make the most of their school life are those who avail themselves of the endless opportunities which are presented through the infrastructure and support which exists at the "Bush".

Higher School Certificate success is the culmination of habits and patterns begun in the junior years. Many of the Year 7 students experienced academic success with Andrew Brimfield, Jeff Wang and David Choi leading the way. Oliver Pase, Tandeep Singh and Haydar Shkara were strong performers in Year 8, while Chris Pooley, Hai De Luo and James Yoon were dominant in Year 9. Year 10 saw Mohammed Zaoud, Abdul Jamal, David Mang and Daniel Habashy set the standard for the School Certificate. The Year 11 academic achievers were Mithan Sriganeshan, Chetan Punjabi, Henry Zhong and Bolin Li.

Natural ability is an ingredient in success but it is enhanced by participation and effort. I believe sport is an important ingredient in the high school experience. Sports Co-ordinator, Ron Tedford, has provided a structure for all levels of sporting participation. In 2003, Homebush was named the Metropolitan North West Zone Champion Sports School, ahead of Epping, Normanhurst, North Sydney, Asquith, Randwick, Ashfield and Macquarie Boys High Schools. We do have many fine athletes, but that is not the reason for success. Homebush won the title because we fielded competitors in every event at the Athletics Swimming and Cross Country Carnivals and participated in all Winter and Summer team competitions.

In summary the boys were placed first in Athletics, Swimming, Summer Sport and second in Cross Country and Winter Sport, earning the coveted Champion School Title. Phillip Havea was the Senior Sportsman of the Year, while Pascal Wallace and Lyle Taualai shared the Junior Sportsman of the Year Award. Noah Essagahir reached National Standard in Speed Skating and Adem Mumci in Tennis. The U/15's Waterpolo team reached the last sixteen in NSW, Shariful Islam was selected to represent NSW in cricket, and Phillip Havea won a silver medal in the Open Hurdles at the NSW Athletics Carnival. Xiao Wang represented the Combined High Schools in Table Tennis.

The tip of the iceberg is very impressive indeed. However, it would not rise like a sentinel for all to see, without the mass of ice beneath the surface which supports it. The supporting unseen mass of ice is reflected in the 5 - P's The people, practices, policies, parents and place which makes up Homebush Boys High School.

The culture of success and high expectations comes from this source. A study skills program is in place for each year. Students have the opportunity to attend overnight enrichment camps. Chess and Public Speaking Teams are entered into various competitions. Thousands of entries are co-ordinated in the various University of NSW Educational Testing Centre competitions. Literacy Strategies earned a "Boys' Lighthouse Education" grant from the Federal Minister for Education, the honourable Dr Brendan Nelson. The Drum Corps was dominant in the Sydney Anzac Day March. Gifted and Talented classes exist in each junior year and in the core subject areas. English and Science weeks expose the students to learning experience outside the classroom. Parent and Student Information Evenings provide feedback and the opportunity to hear relevant information from the Board of Studies.

Technology continues to march into every classroom. Twenty one rooms have been re-carpeted. All external and internal surfaces have been repainted in the last two years. The whole of the Western Grass Area has been re-surfaced, re-turfed and had a watering system installed. Teaching practices continue to improve to meet the challenges of new curriculum and the increasingly complex needs of students. Twenty one staff received "National Excellence in Teaching Award" nominations from the boys. Our enrolments now approach 1200, a sure sign of parent and community satisfaction with the school...... all that ice under the surface certainly keeps us busy and makes the school a vibrant environment.

I have outlined a few of the high points for a small number of students. Many more contribute to the "Bushy ethos". I could talk about the effort and commitment of Daniel Kissick or Jibraan El-Ahmad. The VET contributions of Mitchell Kerr and Ronald Tran, the participation of Chris McCarney in the "Peer Reading Program" the boys involved in the opening ceremony of the Rugby World Cup, the 931 boys who entered the Mathematics Competition, Michael Kirby and his contributions to various performance evenings, the artists who were selected to exhibit in "Art-Express", the leadership of Bill Staines in the Drum Corps, the initiative and responsibility shown by Abdul Jamal and Mohammed Zaoud. the list is endless. The "Bushy Boys" of today are the citizens of tomorrow.

Most of the boys who attend Homebush Boys High School are decent young fellows who are supported by caring, responsible and motivated parents. The P & C and School Council are vehicles where that support can be translated into action to enhance the school. The support is invaluable, but comes from a relatively small base consider being one of the active parents.

Dr Paterson continues to be at the forefront of educational theory and practice. His strong emphasis on quality teaching and creating opportunities for all students to reach their potential has made the "Bush" an exemplar school in "Boys Education". His leadership is translated into action by the laconic, Deputy Jurd. Tim Jurd is underpaid and overworked as he leads various areas of technology, pedagogy, training and development and volleyball in the school. The senior executive provides leadership in all the areas which count and are ably supported by the remainder of the staff.

The outstanding ESL outcomes and the publication of the Bush Bulletin result from the efforts of Kerry Meucci, a fact which was recognised with a "Granville District Award for Excellence in Teaching". Ron Tedford received recognition after becoming the longest serving, and best, Sports Co-ordinator in the history of Homebush Boys.

Alan Brawn, one of the finest men and most professional head teachers I have worked with retired after 35 years teaching at Homebush Boys High School. He has been a "life model" for every student and teacher who has been associated with him over this period.

The School continues to grow, more staff, more students, more demountables. We have reached site capacity. The challenge is to maintain the culture and the personalised nature of learning at the "Bush". If we all believe "the best is yet to come" and work towards it, then that will be our future, ... I certainly believe it to be my future.























A sea of excited, yet nervous, faces greeted me when I stood at the front of the first assembly for the year 7 cohort for 2003.

Musical talent was also regularly on display and further emphasised the enormous opportunities provided by the school to excel in a range of fields.







To the many parents and guardians who so actively support your sons - what a wonderful job you're doing! One day, they might even appreciate it!


Next year is a particularly important year, scholastically. I hope that these young men continue to develop their tolerance and maturity alongside their study routines.



It has been my pleasure to continue as the boys Year Adviser this year, and I look forward to another year of continuing excellence from them in 2004 and on into their HSC year in 2005.



















English Faculty

The second 'generation' of changes in the English curriculum is about to take effect with the new Stage 4 syllabus to be implemented in Years 7 and 8 in 2004. This closely follows the new HSC that was first implemented into the preliminary course in 2000. The times, they are a changin' (apologies to Bob Dylan). So it is either an exciting time or a time of much trepidation.

So with much hard work and dedication the staff have produced some innovative and detailed programmes which we are eagerly waiting to teach in the new year. The programmes will explicitly engage the students in new multimedia texts and the more tradition written texts in order to provide students with the best opportunities to develop their communication and critical literacy skills.

Reflecting on the past 3 terms, I have to thank the English staff for their support and acknowledge their outstanding contributions in the classroom and within the faculty. Their dedication to the boys' education is exemplary. Everyone has contributed to the development of the Stage 4 programmes. We are all eternally grateful to Sam Hague and his technical wizardry with the computers. Also, his work with the public speaking students and competitions he has initiated have demonstrated his dedication and his hard work. Gin Tauber's hard work and organisational skills made English Week a runaway success and promoted the importance of literacy and English to the boys. Our school entered the Australasian English and Writing competitions with excellent results. Over 35% of the boys achieved Credit or Distinctions in both competitions. These competitions were well organised by Sharon Burns. Rob Wills' expertise in Gifted and Talented was utilised well with his work with targeted students from Years 8 to 10. The boys constantly produced work of the highest calibre. Kerri Morey's work with the debating teams and her time relieving as Head of Department were excellent contributions to the faculty. Cassie McGuinness' work with the Years 7 and 8 debating team was crucial in the boys' development as debaters and they progressed well into the competition. Rhonda Roberts' and Michael Klein's wisdom and experiences were vital in their work with debaters, Extension English and grading for the School Certificate. Judith Edwards and Paul Koff's work with students with needs helped cater for the boys' welfare and educational developments. I look forward to supporting and working with all the staff in 2004.


There were significant improvements in the School Certificate results after the disappointments of 2002. Whilst no student achieved a band 6 (the state trend was a decrease in band 6 by about 30%), over 56% of the students attained a band 5 and 4 - the state average. This is a very pleasing trend that I hope we can improve on in 2004. The Higher School Certificate results were even better. 75% of the students attained in the top 2 bands in the Extension I course. Over 52% of the Advanced English students achieved results in the top 2 bands. In the Standard English course, over 50% of the students were in the top 2 bands, again, well above the state average. The ESL course also had students performing very well, with 2 boys achieving top 10 results - an outstanding set of results. At the risk of sounding like a scratched CD, these

excellent results and outcomes are further indication of the dedication and persistence of the English and ESL staff.

The excitement will continue in 2004 with the planning and development of new programmes to be implemented in Year 9 in 2005. As well, there is the need to further consolidate the changes of some modules and texts in the HSC courses. These are some of the reasons teachers feel fortunate. We are constantly faced with challenges and opportunities to develop as educators. Rarely do we not take up these challenges and opportunities.

I look forward to 2004.

Each morning the students listened to a variety of teachers reading extracts from their favourite novels. The students were enthralled with the readings.



All of the ESL students performed very well in the paper, with no student scoring below Band 3. In total, for 79% of the students who sat for the exam, an average mark of 82% was achieved. At the time of writing we are still awaiting the results of this year's HSC.

This year we welcomed a new teacher to the fold: Ms Jill MacDonald. So, it was with a bigger team that we started the year, full of enthusiasm, optimism and good ideas for making a difference in ESL education. Late last year Mrs Lacek was presented a Granville District Award for Excellence in Teaching in recognition of her dedication and hard work, especially with the Year 7 wide-reading program. This year Ms Meucci received the same award for her work in ESL education and especially for her editing and publishing of the Bush Bulletin. Last year, Ms Sahyoun was also awarded a certificate for the support she has given to the Public Speakers. And this year Ms Horiatopoulos was awarded a nomination for Excellence in Teaching.

We have students and teachers from many different language backgrounds at Homebush Boys and we are proud of the harmonious relationship that exists here. SOCIAL SCIENCE



2003 may not have been the best of years but it was also not the worst of years. Curriculum developments continue apace and developments in the school's reporting system have consumed a great deal of time and effort in developing appropriate assessment experiences and result compilation. Systemic requirements of reporting, welfare, accountability and pedagogy, added to increasingly frequent syllabus change, have combined to increase the expectations placed on teachers yet further.

Ms Allan returned from leave and shared her teach-

ing with Ms Wilson,who has decided to take a different pathway next year. We thank her for the care and attention she gave all students in her classes and for the genuine concern she showed for the welfare of all boys in her care. Ms Uhlen replaced Ms Gardener and has been a wonderful asset to the department.

Outcomes based reporting became the practice for Stage 6 courses, making it the universal school reporting method. Consequently, a great deal of administrative effort is now consumed in the design of assessment instruments, the marking, recording and processing of results and in entering the achieved outcomes on the final reports. It is to be hoped that such detailed pupil profiling is meaningful and valuable to all stakeholders.

The 2002 HSC saw the second cohort of senior students attempting the revamped HSC, with its standards based marking system. Modified assessment rubrics did not appear to radically alter the achievements of our students, although some anomalies in the state-wide proportion of Band 6 awards in individual subjects still appears to be occurring. The intellectual demands of some subjects is beyond the capacity of their natural clientele. Our candidates performed broadly in line with their anticipated results, with capable students who worked consistently showing the way. While this is hardly a revelation, it is always gratifying to see effort rewarded.

By far the most exciting results were achieved by students in our first ever class presenting Studies of Religion, 1 Unit. Our 7 candidates achieved 2 band 6 and 3 band 5 results - 71% of candidates compared to the 41% achieved statewide. Congratulations to Mr Francis and the SOR bovs on setting the stage for this subject having a long-term place in the school's HSC curriculum. In Economics, the results were generally pleasing: our 35 candidates achieved 3 band 6 and 12 band 5 results, with the mean mark very close to state average. A small Geography class, most ofwhom had significant literacy needs, found the going difficult but managed a band 5 and a band 4. Geography was one of the better results for most candidates. Legal Studies scored 6 band 4 and 5 band 3 results from 13 candidates, while Business Studies' 56 candidates gained 2 band 6 and 11 band 5 awards. This was a little disappointing when compared to the heights of the previous HSC but several of the band fives were just below the band 6 cut-off and Business Studies was the best or equal best result for a majority of candidates.

Despite a much broader senior curriculum, but one whose structure allows candidates to concentrate their studies into a narrower range of disciplines, a healthy proportion of students are opting for Social Sciences subjects. However, a less academically gifted clientele is becoming evident in some subjects and an increasing number of the most able students are narrowing their HSC course selections into maths and sciences rather than tackle the heavy literacy demands of the humanities. The 2003 HSC year comprises three Business Studies classes, two each of Economics and Studies of Religion and one Legal Studies. Preliminary course acceptance is even a little stronger, with three classes in both Business Studies and Economics, one in Legal Studies and two in Studies of Religion. Geography appears to have succumbed to a combination of wider curriculum choices, a perception that other subjects offer more rewarding career options and the legacy of Stage 4 and 5 syllabuses.

In the junior school, concerns were expressed in last year's report about school and indeed statewide results in Geography-Civics. The structure of this paper highlights the

emphasis of literacy in all current school syllabuses: good readers and writers have a distinct advantage; students with language difficulties are at a disadvantage, to a large degree attributable to somewhat arcane wording in certain questions. We have worked very hard on a number of strategies to improve results achieved in 2002 (only 1% band 6, compared to 5% state - in itself a very low proportion) and look forward to a much better showing in this year's School Certificate. Commerce continues to be a popular elective subject for junior school students, with four classes in both Years 9 and 10. The quality of work produced by students in all years is quite remarkable. It is evident in tests, but is most obvious when students are given more open-ended tasks, where they have a much freer rein in task design and content. Some of the assignment work so produced is exceptional. Unfortunately, highly structured tasks are becoming more prominent in assignment work as part of the strategy to improve School Certificate results.

Classroom excellence has been enhanced by a number of field studies and enrichment activities of various types. Some of the main field studies were the

- * Year 7 viewing a feature film on Antarctica at the IMAX Theatre, illustrating the fragile ecosystem of this extreme continent
- * Year 8 Geography study of the Sydney water supply system to Warragamba Dam
- * Year 9 Geography study of the impact of farming practices on land, soil and water resources and environmentally sustainable management at Fairfield City Farm
- * Year 10 Geography students' study of coastal processes and management at Longreef and Collaroy Beaches
- * Year 10 Commerce experience of the interactive exhibits on sport and its importance to the Australian tourism industry and the ecology exhibit at the Powerhouse Museum, supplemented by "Sydney, Story of a City" at the IMAX.

Reports of several of these field studies appear in this year book.

Other highlights for 2003 include:

- * 102 students entered the Australian Geography Competition. They achieved 8 High Distinction and 13 Distinction awards.
- * 31 syndicates entered the ASX Sharemarket Game. Most syndicates experienced the harsh realities of a bear market but Chetan Punjabi, Mohit Bhanabhai and Abhishek Sharma, trading as Laxmi Investors turned such a good profit as to run sixth in the state. (They were third up to the day before the competition ended.) They received their awards at a ceremony whose invited guests included Dr Refshauge, David Koch and Nick Farr-Jones.
- * In the Australian Business Studies Competition, 44 Homebush students entered for 2 High Distinctions (top 5%) and 4 Distinctions.
- * Similarly, 38 students entered the Australian Economics Competition for 5 Distinction awards.
- * Peter Morkos of Year 11 had enormous success in enrichment experiences related to his school work in Business Studies. Peter participated in a highly successful Young Achievers company "Empiya". He went on, through a series of written tests and oral presentations, to the final series of the Young Business Person of the Year awards. Peter was also selected to participate in the Australian Business Week, where each group of participants runs a computer-simulated company, making all business decisions in an attempt to maximize business value but also being responsible for writing an annual report and producing a video presentation. Peter's company was one of three runners-up. His third foray was into the World Skills Australia Retail Competition, where Peter placed 3rd in the state after a series of examinations and presentations to a judging panel over 2 days and 3 nights. Peter's initiative and enthusiasm thoroughly deserve

the rewards, contacts and experiences he has gained. Congratulations to all students who took advantage of the many enrichment opportunities made available to them.

In my final magazine report, I would like to take the opportunity of recording my thanks to the many wonderful people, both staff and students, parents and community members, with whom my years at Homebush have brought me in contact. Your many and varied qualities have certainly enriched my life experiences and made my years at the Bush pass all too quickly. I would particularly wish to record my appreciation of the loyalty and dedication of the social scientists who have given me such unselfish and wholehearted support over the years. Coastal Management -Year 10 Geography Field Study



Collaroy and Narrabeen beaches together form a beach 3.6km in length. Together Fishermans - Collaroy - Narrabeen beaches have the most intense shoreline development in Warringah Shire.

The purpose of the excursion on the 19th of May, was to identify important elements of a coastal environment, examine the impact of natural disasters and human development on coastal sand dunes, and investigate strategies in coastal land management.


Investigations were conducted in several groups to discover the dune profile, processes, landforms, impacts, and management strategies of the beach. Equipment such as clinometers were used to measure dune elevation and anemometers to check wind speed to understand dune profiles and the significance of vegetation in protecting dunes from erosion. The comparison of human development over the past 50 years, such as the building of "the Flight Deck," and strategies used to protect the beach from erosion show that the natural dune cycle has been interrupted in this stretch of beach.

In conclusion, the excursion was educational and raised awareness that this is not a short term problem. Long-term strategies must be put forward to protect the beach and also human development on the primary dune which are at risk.

ACTIVITY BASED ON 10 GEOGRAPHY FIELDWORK

Imagine you are on the Coastal Management Committee of Warringah Council. You have been asked to present an effective strategy that will protect the beach from further erosion. Make a recommendation as to which strategy or strategies will minimize storm impacts in the most cost efficient manner.

Repurchasing private land by the council is an effective strategy. The council can remove houses built on the primary dune and then revegetate the dunes so that when there

is a storm, the beach and dunes would have the 'normal' cycle rather than having houses dragged out in to the sea. Repurchasing will be expensive, very expensive in fact, but it's a long term management strategy so there will not be a need to have sand nourishment programs or building sea walls to lessen the impact of the destructive storm waves.

As a member of the council, I would suggest the relocation process where properties at risk of damage by coastal processes are relocated away from the active zone. Replenishing the beach with sand nourishment will replace any sand lost and make it lush. Also I would put forward a future development strategy, which limits the building of property near the seaward boundary.

I believe that development setback and repurchase are the only two options that, in the long run, will minimize storm impacts. All the land on the primary and secondary dunes must be bought, and development must be limited. Then all the dunes must be rehabilitated and revegatated. This will hold the sand together and thus help prevent erosion. Also this makes the beaches look more beautiful. The presence of primary dunes reduces storm wave impact. Although these management strategies are very expensive in the short term, since there are losses of revenue by disallowing more development, and buying properties is very expensive, these options are the only options that will work in the long term. All other options are ongoing processes, which is why you have to keep on spending money. They also destroy the beaches and the ecosystems that depend on the beach. That itself is too big of a loss for us to cope with and in reality those other options aren't really long term management strategies.

TAS MULTIMEDIA




again about Mining and Geology in Australia.


Whether we deserved to lose every debate remains a mystery. Nevertheless, History debating was a competitive, worthwhile and fun activity.

MATHEMATICS

A number of staff changes occurred during 2003. At the end of 2002 we farewelled to Mr.Dale, Mr.Rapson and Ms.Oliver.

We welcomed Mr.Betts and Mr.Aboud who are also involved with Computing Studies. Also, Ms.Dare and Mrs.Shadwick returned from leave.

During 2003 the Mathematics Faculty continued with a number of activities including Mathematics Challenge. Mathematics Competitions and devoted a lot of time to preparing for the implementation of a new Mathematics Syllabus for Years 7 & 8 in 2004.

HSC Results 2003

Our Mathematics results were once again outstanding. Eleven boys were placed in the top band of the Extension 2 course, 30 boys were in the Extension 1 top band and ten boys were placed in the top band of the Mathematics paper. The names of these students who scored 90 marks in a course were published in the List of HSC Distinguished Achievers in the newspapers. These 51 names on the Mathematics list placed our school fifth in the state for comprehensive high schools.

When expressed as a percentage of candidates, our 52 mentions from a total of 279 papers sat meant that 19% of papers sat by our boys were on the list - the same percentage as 2002.

School Certificate

Year 10 faced the School Certificate External Test on Tuesday, 11th November. This was the fifth year of the new format where students are given their result placing them in

The results were once again highly impressive with 10.83% of our students in Band 6 (State - 5.41%) and 46.79% in the top two bands compared with 26.06% of the state. 79.30% of our students were in the top three bands compared with 58.41% of state.

Mathematics Competitions

The impressive results of the Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians, the Australian Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad, the University of NSW Mathematics Competition, The Australian Mathematics Competition and the Hunter Mathematics Competition for Year 10 Standard Students are outlined in the Competition Section of the Magazine.

We hope that students find 2004 even more challenging than this year.

MATHEMATICS COMPETITION

Of the 931 students entered in the Competition, one student was awarded a Prize, eight students received a Certificate of High Distinction, 146 obtained a Distinction and 352 achieved a credit. All entrants will receive at least a Certificate of Participation and an individual performance report.

Yi Cheng Cai was awarded the Prize for his outstanding performance in the Year 11 section placing him in the top 0.5% in the state. Yi Cheng was identified as the school's best entrant and received a Special Achievement Award.

Gordon Tan & Jeff Wong of Year 7, Hayder Shkara of Year 8, Michael Jin of Year 9, Nicholas Chu & Stephen Li of Year 10 and Chetan Punjabi & Chih Hwan Yang of Year 11 were the High Distinctions recipitents placing them in the top 2% in the state.

This year, almost half a million secondary school students tested their maths skills in the biggest annual event in the school calendar here and one of the largest of its type globally. Entries included 364,000 Year 7-12 students from 2,369 Australian schools and over 96,000 students from 936 schools in 35 overseas countries with a Prize or High Distinction Award a rare and prestigious achievement.

Established in 1978, the Competition has been popular with students ever since and is the largest Mathematics competition of its type in the world. Run by the Canberra based Australian Mathematics Trust, which is comprised of educators and mathematicians from all over the country, the competition is sponsored by Westpac Banking Corporation, the University of Canberra and the Canberra Mathematical Association.

Aimed at making maths fun, this competition is designed with the average student in mind. It also identifies those with exceptional ability, some of whom go on to represent Australia at the International Mathematical Olympiad.

The competition is unique. The problems are intended to be non-intimidating and can inspire confidence in average students to extend themselves. There is also still a challenge for the more talented. It is an educational event that has been acknowledge and copied overseas.

Boys are advised to include their certificate in their job portfolio as it can only be of benefit when seeking employment.

This year the organisers again released standardised results for the best students allowing comparison between years within a school and consequently identifying the school's best entrant. The best standardised results achieved were as follows:

MATHEMATICS COMPETITIONS 2003

Our students have an outstanding record in Mathematics competitions. Pupils were again involved in the Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians, The Australian Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad, The University of NSW Mathematics Competition, The Australian Mathematics Competition and The Hunter Mathematics Competition for Year 10 Standard Students.

Homebush was to the fore in Mathematics Competition results. Chih Hwan Yang of Year 11 was awarded a Certificate of Merit in the University of NSW Mathematics Competition and Jake Holub received a Prize for being placed fifteenth in NSW in the Standard Mathematics Competition.

Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians

During the year boys from Years 7 to 10 were involved with the Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians under the guidance of Mr Ha. It has two stages commencing with a three week Challenge in April consisting of six problems done at home.

First Stage

Thirty-five boys received certificates for the first stage. In an outstanding performance, Kevin Zhu of Year 7 was awarded a Distinction Certificates. Four boys received Credit Certificates and thirty boys received Certificates of Participation.

Consequently the School's Year 9-10 team of best four students were placed in the top 14%. The School's Year 7-8 team of best four students were placed in the top 25%.

Second Stage.

Seven boys completed the Second or Enrichment Stage which runs from April to October. This involved working independently through series notes within a flexible sixteen week period from April to September and attempting solutions to problems. The boys' fees were subsidised by the Excellence Fund - thanks to Mr.Pinkey.

Abhinav Khanna of Year 10 & Nelson Zheng of Year 8 were awarded High Distinctions - an incredible performance in this difficult activity. Distinction Certificates were awarded to Mark Han of Year 9 and a Credit Certificate was awarded to Simon Chung of Year 7. Participation Certificates were presented to Patrick Tang of Year 8 and Daniel Choi of Year 7.

University of NSW Mathematics Competition

On Tuesday 17 June six boys from Years 11 & 12 sat for this difficult competition which involves completing six questions in three hours. Only those exceptional students of mathematics attempt this competition. Only a limited number of certificates are awarded.

We were pleased when Henry Yang of Year 11 was presented with a Certificate of Merit.

Hunter Mathematics Competition for Year 10 Standard Students

On Tuesday 29 July ten boys from our Year 10 Standard class, were involved in this competition. Over 900 students from across the state benefited from this competition.

The boys received one Prize, four Distinctions, four Credits and one Pass awards.

Jake Holub was awarded a Prize, Jesse Martin,

James Bartol-Laham, Todd Bollard & Ben Lameri received Distinction Awards, Alan Williams, David Lekanic, Jack Coppard & Phillip Browne were awarded a Credit Certificate, and Matthew Petrucci achieved a Pass.

Mr.Doolan and his class have worked hard to achieve our best results ever.

Australian Mathematics Competition

On Tuesday 29 July 931 boys were involved in the 2003 Australian Mathematics Competition - the largest Mathematics competition of its type in the world. This was 52 more than the record number of 879 Homebush students set in 2002.


A selection of Ozspell competitors was to challenge a teacher to a spelling quiz and it was all to be filmed in our library!



Spring One Day Tournament



Principal Practises Life Long Learning

Homebush Boys' High School Principal Ian Paterson had an exciting start to term 2 when he attended the University of NSW to accept a Doctorate of Education degree. This Doctoral degree study followed earlier academic success by Dr. Paterson in his career which had included a Masters of Arts (Honours) and a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) mainly in the area of Geography from Sydney University.

The Doctoral thesis title was very relevant to the workplace challenges faced by high school administrators. The thesis title "An exploration of select variables which influence student achievement in the senior secondary school" examined the importance of gender, authenticity and selectivity in determining achievement of Year 11 students in a sample of single sex, co-educational and selective high schools.

Dr Paterson explained "The results of the thesis have been very useful for the development of strategies at Homebush Boys', especially in the area of study skills, as it is clear that in general terms boys need explicit assistance with homework and study skills". It is especially important in the senior school where long-term goals have to be set to achieve the major assessment standards. Boys need to have the research knowledge and study skills to organize their limited time and available resources. In addition, Dr Paterson found that the parental background factor was also very important in the success of senior students. As a result, Homebush Boys' is concentrating on greater communication with all parents.

The week was further enhanced for Dr Paterson when Homebush Boys' was announced as a successful recipient of a Commonwealth Government Boys' Education Lighthouse program grant. The grant will be used to strengthen the already impressive Literacy programs at the school and just as importantly enable "us to share ideas with other schools and colleagues", Dr Paterson added.

Peer Mediation

The Peer Mediation program is now in its second year and running strong!

Mediation is a process of resolving conflicts where the disputants sit down face to face and talk, uninterrupted, about the dispute. Two trained student mediators, who are totally neutral and do not take sides, lead the process. The mediators make sure the mediation session is helpful and fair to both disputants. They help develop mutual respect and clear communication between the two parties. Everything they hear in the session is kept confidential - NO TEACHERS INVOLVED. The types of conflicts dealt with include name-calling, rumours and friendship breakdowns.

Peer mediation was first started in 2001 with Phillip Havea, Mitchell Kerr, Kali Cama and Shridhar Kapodistrias as mediators. They set up the program, and ran it for 18 months, with Shridhar co-ordinating the group. They then helped train our 2003 mediators - Simon Lam, Wassi Haider, Tanveer Karamuzzaman, Saad Qudrat, George Siomos, and Ramy Yassa, The mediators have great communication and problem solving skills and are expert critical thinkers.

The Peer Mediation program has helped a lot of students resolve problems by talking it out. It is a very important part of our school welfare.




We moved into the semis but an unfortunate draw placed us against the number 1 team - Epping, ...we were defeated.






er but he will be remembered as the best server on the team.

The final against Macquarie was a great win for the boys against bigger opponents - fortitude and resilience the winners on the day.






Our goal-keeper seemed to change from time to time but Joseph Encarnacao was the most prominent.
